Top Folk Acts Head for Wessex Folk Festival

Some of the country's top folk acts will play alongside local favourites when the Wessex Folk Festival returns to its traditional, two-day format over the weekend of June 3 and 4.

Top of the bill on the main stage on Saturday will be Merry Hell, the popular Lancashire-based eightpiece folk-rock band, who recently added Weymouth's Simon Swarbrick to their line-up on violin. A favourite with audiences at festivals and folk clubs across Britain, Merry Hell play an energetic mix of their own songs that draw on the best of the folk music tradition.

Festival Director, Bob Ford said: 'I'm really excited that we can now announce the full stage line-up for the Wessex Folk Festival. We have a line-up of nationally known and local acts on two festival stages and I have been amazed that so many great acts have agreed to join us for the first two-day festival since 2019. It cements our position as one of the very best and largest totally free folk festivals in the country.'

Radio 2 Folk Award winners, The Trials of Cato, are another leading act making their first appearance at the Wessex Folk Festival. The Welsh/English trio feature banjo, bouzouki, guitars and mandolin to create new takes on traditional folk songs.

Songwriter Reg Meuross makes a return to the festival, bringing his captivating songs that tell stories of struggles and injustices, past and present. Songs in a contrasting style will be provided by the ever-popular Gaz Brookfield, who teams up with fiddle player Ben Wain for the festival.

The intricate vocal harmonies of Devon-based duo Harbottle & Jonas will provide some intimate moments and an exciting close to the festival is promised by Wight Hot Pipes, who play their own songs alongside covers from all genres, enlivened by the sound and spectacle of fire-breathing bagpipes.

Bob Ford added: 'Festival goers will be able to see some great local acts like State of Undress, Emma Gale and our own David Gordon. There are even shanty teams like Dorset Wrecks, as well

World Fair Trade Day

This year, World Fair Trade Day was held on Saturday 13 May, a day to celebrate the achievements of the Fairtrade Movement and to remind ourselves of the importance of the principles of Fairtrade.

The day was organised by the World Fair Trade Organisation (WFTO) an international network of over 450 Fair Trade enterprises from more than 80 countries that focus on supporting, developing and promoting businesses who are committed to Fair Trade. This year the theme for the day was 'Reimagining the Economy: Regenerative Businesses for the Future.' The current economic model has brought about unsustainable levels of resource consumption, environmental degradation, and social inequality.

And thinking about environmental degradation, The Great Big Green Week this year is to be held from the 10th to the 18th June and is the UK's biggest ever celebration of community action to tackle climate change and protect nature.

In their promotional film the organisers say -

'We have hope because solutions to the climate crisis already exist. We need to cut emissions and move towards cheaper and cleaner renewables. We need to protect and restore our natural world and we must support people at home and overseas from the worst effects of climate change. Together we will show decision makers that we want to see more and faster action to tackle climate change, protect nature and bring down the cost of living to keep the next generation safe.'

It is up to all of us to make this a reality.

We expect to have rice, tea, coffee, chocolate and all the other crops not grown in the UK, available in our supermarkets but it is the farmers who produce them who are most affected by the extremes of climate change.

In Malawi they are used to frequent droughts and floods but these are getting worse and crops are regularly destroyed. Then in March Malawi was hit by Cyclone Freddy which caused catastrophic flash flooding. Half a million people were displaced and over 1,000 killed. The nation's power grid was crippled when the hydroelectric dam was rendered inoperable.

In East Africa too they are on the brink of famine. Five failed rainy seasons in a row have killed livestock and crops driving over 7 million people from their homes in search of food. Heavy rains came in March this year but that was not good news. Flash flooding from the heavy rains killed dozens and affected 300,000 people in Ethiopia and Somalia. Rivers flooded and homes, schools, and health facilities were destroyed along

the banks of two rivers in southern Somalia and eastern Ethiopia. Although rainfall can provide some relief, intense rainfall following extensive drought washes away crops and topsoil. Most of the farms in the area also lack the infrastructure to store water for future use. Following this unexpected heavy rain further drought is expected.

Supporting Fairtrade helps to give farmers the chance to improve infrastructure and alter their farming techniques to cope with ever changing challenges.

Trading Standards news: Protected Food Names

What do Champagne, Parma Ham and Scotch Whisky all have in common? They are protected food names. Dorset and the South West are also home to some fantastic traditional foods that carry the same legal protection as some of these well-known foods, such as watercress!

Dorset and the surrounding counties are home to the watercress industry, with several of the largest growers based here. Between them they supply the majority of all watercress sold in UK supermarkets. Watercress using 'Nasturtium Officinale seeds' has been grown in flowing water to a traditional production method used for over 200 years. Recently this industry came under threat from cheaper imports of 'Landcress'

being passed off as Watercress. Other cresses may look similar but are not produced in the same way, and do not have the same characteristic 'peppery' taste or contain the same levels of nutrients. To counter this the industry came together and successfully applied for the name 'watercress' to be protected and it was awarded the status of 'Traditional Speciality Guaranteed'.

Other foods produced in Dorset that are protected include Dorset Blue Cheese, West Country Farmhouse Cheddar Cheese, West Country Beef and Lamb, and the newly registered 'New Forest Pannage Ham' made from pigs that are fattened up on acorns whilst roaming the New Forest!

Looking more widely across the region there is also the famous Cornish Pasty, Exmoor Blue Cheese, Wiltshire Cured Ham, Fal Oysters from Cornwall, Cornish Clotted Cream and Cornish Sardines.

There are three different types of protection. These are Protected Geographical Indication (PGI), Protected Designation of Origin (PDO) and Traditional Speciality Guaranteed' (TSG). You can recognise protected food as it must carry an appropriate logo.

Anyone wishing to produce a food that carries a protected food name must be audited against a published specification before they start to sell the food. Trading Standards typically carry out these audits to help both protect food names and the interests of local food producers.



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South Dorset with 13 doors on display



Our current monarch is well known for his 'green' credentials. I am probably less well known for mine and have never knowingly hugged a tree. But all Senior Citizens are concerned about the state of their planet, and we support methods to reduce global warming.

However, to help with this there was a recent suggestion that we might be asked to use up to seven recycling bins for different types of waste. This seemed to be going a bit far and sounded a huge number. Then I realised that we already have three, or four if you include my garden waste bin. So, it's only three more, but they might be the straw that breaks the camels, or to be more precise, my back.

It is relatively easy to work things out at the moment. If it's food waste it goes in the brown bin, if it's a newspaper, clear plastic or a tin it goes the green one and everything else goes in the grey. Except glass bottles which go in the open box. Nearly forgot that one, which makes five in total. But what sort of problems will there be with seven bins? Will we for instance have to segregate different newspapers into different bins? And then we would have to find somewhere to keep this multiplicity of receptacles and worse still, have to remember on what day each one is due to be emptied. Endless opportunities for discord leading to all sorts of additional marital stress.

For example, my In-house Adviser might insist that it is the purple bin being emptied today while I am sure it is the turquoise one. And it will not go well for me, right or wrong.

But I digress. My concern for the environment extends to reading reports to educate me on what's good and what's bad for our climate. A recent article dealt with Britain's boggy peatlands which are, and I quote, 'a vital secret weapon against climate change, capturing carbon and protecting against flooding and drought.' They are also described as a windlashed and waterlogged home to a vast array of important flora and fauna. The efforts being made to sustain our peat bogs are all very commendable, for apparently they store three times more

carbon than all our forests. But I must declare slight mixed feelings about all this. Some ten or more years ago, with friend Hugh, I undertook to walk Wainwright's Coast to Coast route right across England from St Bee's Bay in Cumbria to Robin Hood's Bay in North Yorkshire. The guidebook says that the latter, once a fishing port. is now a tourist destination and famous for the fossils which may be found on its beach. Which is a pretty good description of Hugh and me as we stood there after 13 davs of walking.

The full walk is a distance of about 197 miles (or 220 with our navigational skills) and as you might suspect it has guite a few ups and downs, or as I like to call them, Over the Hills. Wainwright's guide suggested that we should start with our feet just in the Irish Sea. and, collecting a pebble from the beach, finish 197 miles later with our feet just in the North Sea, throwing the pebble into it. A laudable idea, but somewhere along the 197 miles my pebble was lost. And I certainly wasn't going back to look for it.

But I digress again. Part of the route goes over the high plateau of the North York Moors which are - you've guessed it - mostly peat bog. There is a famous quote which says, 'When you're up to your neck in alligators, it's hard to remember that your initial objective was to drain the swamp.' Or to put it another way. When you've spent six hours trudging across a featureless, wind-lashed, waterlogged plateau knee deep in mud, it is difficult to focus on the wonderful assistance peat bogs provide to the planet. I defy anyone not to consider cheerfully swopping a carbon emission or two for a mile of flat, solid, dry path.

Toiling on towards the sound of gunfire – at least we weren't the target. Who would want to be a grouse? - towards the end of a long, long day we dropped down towards Keld and to our surprise came upon a sign pointing up a farm track promising 'Cream Teas.' We briefly considered whether this was the equivalent of the 'wreckers' along the Jurassic Coast who lit fires to lure ships onto the rocks so they could plunder them. Would we follow the sign only to be set upon by rucksack robbers who would steal the only thing we had that was worth anything, our dry socks? But the lure of a cup of tea and a cream scone was too much and we took the gamble.

The tearoom turned out to be a barn open at one end furnished with tables and benches. At least it was dry and out of the wind. It was also surprisingly crowded with about 10,000 inhabitants - Hugh and me and 9,998 midges. But the scones were homemade, the tea hot, wet and plentiful and it was served by a number of delightful young children. Some years later, watching a now well-known TV programme, I spotted the farm as the home of the 'Yorkshire Shepherdess.'The whole family are now very famous TV personalities, but Hugh and I met them first.

That evening we stayed in Keld, the halfway point of the walk, in the hotel which I had last stayed in nearly 50 years before when it was a Youth Hostel. All the rooms here had notices on the walls saying 'Don't open the windows. It lets the midges in!' Which goes to show that conservation depends on your point of view. The peat bog was our idea of hell, but to captured carbon - and ten million midges - it was heaven.


Future Productions

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Allergic Rhinitis = could the cause be tree pollens.



In Europe, the prevalence of birch pollen sensitisation is estimated to be around 8-16%, and of those, approximately 70% cross react with food sources (pollen food syndrome). Foods include: almond, apple, apricot, carrot, celery, cherry, hazelnut, kiwi, nectarine, peanut, peach, pear, plum, potato, soya and walnut. Birch trees produce pollen via yellow catkins that hang down from the branches, like other tree pollens, the pollen grains are incredibly small and fine. Tree pollen can be carried long distances by the wind or even a light breeze, so direct contact may not be necessary to experience symptoms. The weather plays a significant role in the production, distribution and dispersion of pollen. The amount of daylight, or the 'photoperiod', is also crucial to pollen production

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weather is cloudy then plants and trees will produce less pollen. Tips from Allergy UK website. 'Check pollen forecasts daily and stay indoors wherever possible when the tree pollen count is high. Hay fever symptoms usually appear when the pollen count exceeds 50. Rain washes pollen from the air so counts should be lower on cooler, wet days. Keep car windows closed and the air intake on 'recirculate' when driving. Keep windows closed when indoors. Avoid drying clothes/ linen outside when pollen counts are high. On high pollen days, shower and wash your hair and change your clothing, especially before going to bed. Wipe pets' coats with a damp cloth to remove pollens when they have been outside. Wear a mask, wraparound sunglasses and a hat with a large peak or brim when outdoors to keep pollen allergens out of your eyes, face and hair. Wearing a face mask has been shown to reduce symptoms of hay fever, by reducing the amount of pollen we inhale, as well as creating a warm humid environment to breathe in which reduces the reactivity of the nose'. Some individuals especially children can find symptoms extremely distressing especially so when sleep is affected. Pharmacists can help with advice and over the counter medications for adults and children such as anti-histamines. There are homoeopathic and herbal remedies that may be beneficial. We are fortunate in Dorset to have a local Homoeopathic Pharmacy in West Stafford, Galen Homoeopathic, helpful with advice and supply of specific pollen remedies. Locally we also have a Medical Herbalist, Eleanor Gallia (MNIMH) Nether Cerne Herbs. Self-help to support the immune system might include increasing the intake of Vitamin C, Zinc and Selenium. You can do this by either eating foods rich in these vitamins and minerals or by

using supplements from your local health food shop. You might try an elimination diet to see if foods are contributing to your symptoms. My experience gained over many years has led me to conclude that the most common symptom triggers are the proteins found in animal based dairy products, pork products and chocolate. It is easy to trial to see if this approach is helpful, simply eliminate the foods (replace with plant products to avoid nutritional deficiencies) for a few weeks and then if feeling better re-introduce one at a time. If the symptoms re-appear you have found your trigger. Elimination diets are recognised as having value if used in this way. Plan presented the first draft to Weymouth Town Council. It has been an absolutely huge piece of work and thanks were given to all those involved. Apart from a consultant employed to ensure that procedures were followed and that every element was covered those taking part all volunteered many, many hours freely. Hence I was surprised by the rancour from some members who disagreed with the draft. DRAFT is the important word here, the draft is now out to you living here in Weymouth. It is very important to have a robust neighbourhood plan as it will feed in and inform the Dorset Local Plan Please make every effort to read the plan, ask questions if you are unsure of any part. The plan covers all aspects of our lives in Weymouth. Please make your comments.

When I was a child Portland Harbour played a significant role in the lives of very many of us. Our Dads were in the Navy, were engineers at the dockyards. Or were scientists. Our small boats took trippers around the harbour to see the ships of her 'Majesty's navy'; and even in the winter boarding houses were occupied by visitors working short contracts there.

Portland Port still looms high for many of us, but sadly not always in such a positive way. The ongoing questions over the location of Powerfuels waste incinerator are still a worry. The location of a barge to house asylum seekers presents a lot of potential problems. As yet not wholly answered. I can see that the barge allows for cost effective accommodation and that it and others need to be moored somewhere. However, I cannot agree that a site with such poor infrastructure and communications is the right one. I am sure that if I had braved the deprivations in reaching the coast of France, crossing the English Channel in a small boat and being placed in inhospitable hostels a

short stay on a boat on the Jurassic Coast of Dorset would seem a blessing. Whilst we are delighted to see so many visitors arriving on amazing cruise ships, the size of small towns, and we love to hear how much they love our vibrant harbour and beautiful beach, how much they boost our economy I am not sure. The buses that transport those visitors use the route from Portland bringing them in to Hope Square via Rodwell Avenue. The bus companies and the port are reluctant to consider an alternative route because the traffic issues makes turn around times unfeasible. But turning one large bus in Rodwell Avenue is a real problem, turning a string is just completely unacceptable for residents.

All three of your Dorset Council elected members for the ward have made representation to Dorset Council, as has Cllr Wakeling of WTC.


We are told that DC, the bus company and Portland Port are in discussion and we will be invited to take part in that discussion in due course. I would have thought talking to us sooner rather than later would have been wise but that does not seem to be the way. What else is happening?

There has been a cabinet reshuffle at DC ahead of the Annual Meeting next week. There is no longer a member representing the south Ridgeway conurbation in Cabinet. That seems short sighted and a shame. The member now responsible for assets knows Weymouth well and I am hopeful that we will be able to build a good relationship with him. I worked very closely with him in his previous role. I expect to retain my role as chairman of the Corporate Parenting Board, and I hope to tell you more about this next time.

Weymouth Town Council will also hold its Annual meeting in the coming week but have decided as far as possible to maintain stability on committees.

The grand Mayor making event no longer takes place in keeping with us now being a town council but





How do you say that?

Now that barbecue season is fast approaching I have been thinking about the word "grill". It applies to something that in the past was called a gridiron, a crisscross of metal heated in the fire to roast meat on (and one of the many forms of medieval torture).

The version used to filter the air or wind has a French spelling, "grille". Oddly, it is supposed to be related to "grail", as in the Holy Grail. There seems to be little in common between a griddle and a vessel, but perhaps the link lies in the fact that the oldest grills were probably griddlestones, solid flat stones heated in the fire, and these could have transmuted into shallow ceramic vessels which would not be suitable (as the grail is generally accepted to be) for drinking from.

Despite often seeing it spelt BarBQ, the word has come from an ancient Caribbean language, probably Arawak, via Spanish "barbacoa", so "barbecue" is the closest we can get in English. Happy barbecuing!
