Chairperson's Report

The Society has a new webmaster and there are quite a few updates being made. We thank the previous website manager for all her assistance over the years keeping it going.

To commemorate the Coronation of King Charles III the WRS felt it would be good to plant more bulbs in the Churchyard on the corner of All Saints Road. Some years back the WRS and residents purchased and planted the daffodils with the assistance of Parks Dept. This time we thought that Camassia, Dutch Iris or Alliums would be nice as they would follow the daffs in flowering, A crocus 'shield' planted in the pattern of the coronation is another possibility. The WRS has approached the Church gardeners regarding this project but to date had no response.

Councillors' Reports

Cllr Helen Toft has got together a small team of volunteers to tidy and clear the small footpath that led to the Rodwell Trail from Rylands Lane. This has always been a no-mans-land with the council abandoning it.

Cllr Brian Heatley brought up the problem of the vastly increased traffic using Portland Road; traffic management sending lorries up Lanehouse Hill and back via Buxton Road has done little to ease problems as the roads are quite simply not fit for purpose. An improvement is to be made on the cycle way across to Portland. There is still a damaged wall on the corner of All Saints Church, but it appears that it will not be repaired until the junction is altered. All residents are still being asked to contact the council and give details of open spaces near them that have been used on a regular basis for any sort of leisure activity, no matter how small. This includes Wyke Gardens, Douglas Road, the little green of Wyke Square. The planning dept are looking at small spaces that are not used so they can build houses on them. These small 'green lungs' are very important to the community and we want to keep them. All new-build housing sites are given green areas but Weymouth seem to want to build on every spare green space. The local problem of the Barge for young male refugees that is to be moored at Portland Port was discussed at length. It is a big concern to all in Wyke. The Home Office briefing just released was unclear on many points. Their claim that local groups are being consulted is not borne out. Portland Port have been asked to investigate the problem of the chaos their coaches are causing in Rodwell when trying to pick up cruise passengers, a suitable pickup point is needed

The incinerator for Portland was refused but the company will probably go to appeal.

Traditional rubbish bins that are being replaced by wheelie bins by Dorset Waste are deemed to be totally inappropriate in conservation areas.

We are waiting to hear if the 9 and 9A bus will still be running in June. We all felt that the bus was being well used but not enough according to the bus company. Although Wyke will have the Number 1 bus it leaves Lanehouse Rocks Road with no public transport.

Councillors tell us that plans for North Quay in Weymouth are still on hold. All agreed that the old Council offices should be removed, as a building company would be more inclined to take the site on without the building.

Memorial Hall

All seems okay with the hall. Bookings are coming in and the hall is being well maintained.

Church

All Saints Church had been running visits to the tower in 2022, this has proved popular with the magnificent view from the top and the chance to ring a bell. They will be booking the visits again this year. The picnic for the Coronation was well attended and went well.

Wyke Square

The planters in the Square are still in need of some upkeep. If you live in the Square you might like to put a few plants or bulbs in the planters this summer. The little green area at the back of Lymes Close was being set aside for wild flowers but the Council grass cutter must have forgotten as it was mown to an inch of its life recently. WRS have spoken to the Council and we now have a meeting with Emily Brown, the new Parks Manager to sort it out and start again. We are hoping for wild flowers and bulbs round the edge and grass and wild flowers in middle. The new trees that have been planted are doing well, a small area under the trees by the footpath we have asked to be left wild. The Council has tried to reduce the wild leek that is taking over in some places. Fly tipping in the Square is being monitored and some residents have CCTV to see who dumps rubbish on other people's doorstep. Waste bins and motor bikes in All Saints Road are still being left on the public footpath.

Planning

No new planning in the area has been on the planning site.

Footpaths and Highways

The Society has contacted the Council and the Rangers about the problem of small motorbikes and cyclists using the footpath along the Fleet. This is now in the hands of the Councillors. We have asked for more signs to go up stating that it is a no cycling footpath. It is sad that the footpath at the back of the holiday camp has all fallen away near Ferrybridge and is impassible. We hear this footpath will be re-routed onto Portland Road.

Residents feel that the bollards at the entrance to Tesco on the Portland Road are a vast improvement and are a help to pedestrians using the store. The yellow lines have been put in place outside the Smugglers pub. The yellow lines give the traffic more space to pass stationary buses, and give a better traffic flow. We have been waiting for 3 years for these lines to be put in, everything comes to those that wait.

Air Quality Monitoring

We are still hoping that a group from All Saints School might find this an interesting project. Please contact the Society if this subject interests you.

Anti-social Behaviour

Again, residents have reported the problem with drug dealing in the area. This has been reported to the Police. Problem areas still seem to be Wyke Gardens, Crab House at Ferrybridge, and the Rymead Fields near the Wessex Water site around the emergency exit areas. There has been a Police presence in the area around Ferrybridge. Residents must report whatever problems they see in relation to drug dealing or any other anti-social behaviour. If the problem has been moved on from Ferrybridge it will turn up somewhere else.

Dog fouling in the area is a constant nuisance. Please report any person you see not picking up after their dog.

Parks and Open Spaces

Residents in Rodwell Road had been keen to upgrade the corner of Castle Hill Road with planting and wild flowers. The large green area has been left by Highways and has been very overgrown. The Council response is that all verges are left for wild flower and will be cut and raked twice a year. They hope that over the years the area will attract more wild flowers and insect life., but the area has been cut and left and the main things coming through are nettles and large docks. The Council seem to have taken little interest in the community spirit that was offered to improve this very prominent junction.

AOB

The Smugglers on Portland Road looks very smart. Residents have remarked on the small sitting out area that is a good use of the space. As we say so often, try to use these local venues or we will lose them.

A broken seat at the top of Westhill Road has been removed, we hope it will be repaired and replaced.

Camper vans have been using the parking area at the Community Centre in Rymead Lane. A resident had been asked by the campers if they could use his water. We now see this area is online as a free area to camp overnight. The Council have been asked to put up notices saying 'No Overnight Camping'. Parked camper vans have also been causing problems for buses and emergency vehicles on All Saints Road. Please let the Society know if you notice any overnight camper vans in your area.

Meeting closed at 8.15pm, next meeting is July 11th 2023 at 7pm.

Preston and Sutton Poyntz councillor update

Thank you to all those residents who attended our meeting on speeding at the Misson Hall

in Sutton Poyntz we were extremely pleased with the turn out with over 40 residents in attendance and we thank Maria from the police for coming along to address the meeting. We will now be undertaking a consultation on 20mph speed zones in Sutton Poytnz in the next year so please stay tuned for more updates on that.

One thing that did come out of the meeting is the need for more enforcement on speeding which is why we need more volunteers to come forward to set up a community speed watch. To keep this viable we will aim to merge this with the Preston and Littlemoor team so we have a good pool of volunteers to draw upon. If you are interested please get in touch. We recently met up with highways to discuss a few local issues such as improved signage for local car parks to encourage more use as opposed to people using residential parking, chasing up the improved drainage works for Bodkin Lane and also trying to secure a date for more re-surfacing works. On May Day bank holiday I spoke with parking enforcement on Bowleaze Coveway (who were on

their third visit of the day to this road) about parking restrictions and were pleased they were patrolling it. We hope the changes we are pushing for will make it easier to prevent obstructive parking in the area. On May 28th (Pentecost) I attended St Andrews for their first service back in the church since its works were completed. The works have really brightened the church up and I look forward to the official re-opening service. Cllr Dickenson recently met with Weymouth town council and he is lobbying for picnic benches and

fruit trees for the area around Elm Park.

I have been challenging the recent change in parking charges. Going back to 2019 when I was first elected I called for a fair rate of charges harmonious across the county and I still believe that to be the best way. I believe the focus should be on filling empty car parks in off peak months as opposed to rinsing customers in the summer months.

Artizan International

I have just returned from the annual BAFTS (British Association of Fair Trade Shops and Suppliers) Conference which is always inspiring but particularly so this year as the first speaker was Susie Hart MBE from Artizan International.

Susie founded Artizan International in 2013 on her return to Harrogate, after 10 years living in Tanzania, where she founded the social enterprise Neema Crafts.

The Neema Crafts Centre provides training & employment for differently-able people, who would otherwise need to street beg to earn a living. Susie started the project with three deaf trainees. on a budget of just £400. The centre has now grown to employ over 120 people with a huge range of disabilities, all of whom are now able to support themselves & their families with dignity & pride.

Susie set up Artizan International to pass on this model to other developing countries where people with disabilities are still discriminated against and they now have projects in Peru and Ecuador. In Ecuador they have established a training & social enterprise centre for people with a wide range of disabilities. As in other parts of Latin America, differently-able people are often to be found on the margins of their society, excluded from employment and therefore consigned to a life of poverty. These are bright, capable people who long for the same chances as everyone else. Artizan International trained and sent out UK volunteers for 1-2 year

placements, to establish the project and train its first 3 groups of artisans, before handing over to a local Ecuadorian couple to lead the project. They are now in the process of doing the same in Peru. The centres in Ecuador and Peru provide training in paper-making, jewellery, screen-printing and sewn textiles, providing disabled artisans with skills and employment to lift them out of poverty. Following their training Artizan International equip them with everything they need to have their own workshops at home, vitally important for those who are wheelchair bound or have limited mobility. They are free to run their own businesses but Artizan international also commit to buying a large quantity of their work every fortnight. This model is extremely emancipating, but also provides a vital safety-net of a regular income, allowing them to support themselves and their families.





The official opening and dedication of the new Weymouth Public Lending and Reference Library on Westwey Road, was carried out by Alderman J A Attwooll, Chairman of the Library Committee, on Monday, 12th July, 1948 at 3.00pm.

The committee met in the St John Ambulance Hall, Westwey Road and the Mayor, Alderman A P Burt, JP, introduced W C Berwick Sayers, the past president of the Library Association and formerly Chief Librarian of Croydon Public Libraries, who addressed the assembly.

The Mayor then invited Alderman Attwooll to address the assembly and invited those present to accompany him to the Library for the opening ceremony.

At the Library, Councillor Oxley,

Description of the building as built

The building is constructed of Orlit Prefabricated units of precast concrete beams, stanchions, roof slabs, and two-leaf cladding, the outer leaf being in cream stucco finish. The whole of the interior concrete is treated with anti-condensation paint.

The Library has a floor area of 1,800 sq feet and provides Lending, Reference and Juvenile Sections, together with Workroom, Librarian's Office, and Staff Cloakroom.

Heating is provided by twelve 2.5kw GEC Unit Heaters, fixed to the walls, thermostatically controlled.

The units are dual purposed and in warm weather, can be used as cooling fans.

Vice-Chairman of the Library Com-

mittee, handed to Alderman At-

twooll a presentation key, who then

opened the door of the building and

declared the library officially open.

The dedication was then performed

by the Rev Canon C A Plaxton, fol-

lowing which the Mayor, Alderman

Attwooll and members of the public entered the building and the Mayor

was registered as the first borrower.

The Library was then opened to the

general public.

The building is lit by sixteen fluorescent tubes, each five feet long, fixed to the undersides of the roof beams. The erection has been carried out by Direct Labour, under the supervision of the Borough Engineer, and the fittings and specialist work as under: -

Floors by - The Limmer & Trinidad Lake Asphalte Company Ltd. Roof covering by - The Ragusa Asphalte Paving Company Ltd. Shelving and Furniture by - Borough Engineer's Department, and Messrs Theo Conwav Ltd. Top: The Library Building as opened in 1948.

Remember Private Fraser in the long running BBC series Dad's Army? If not, perhaps you are a bit too young to be reading Over the Hill, so ask your Granddad or Grandma for details.

Anyway, Private Fraser was the dour Scot who regularly exclaimed, in the midst of some minor WWII Home Guard crisis, 'We're doomed. We're all doomed' in a broad Scottish accent. Must confess that with all the gloomy news around at the moment James, for such was his first name (although the scriptwriters for some obscure reason also nicknamed him Taffy) might have a point.

When trying to take my mind off miserable things I turned, as no doubt you often do, to reading about astronomy. Experts from three leading American universities have been studying a star 12,000 light years away. Not sure how far a light year is, but 12,000 of them are, I suspect, an awfully long way. Probably take about the same time to cover that distance as it takes to get along Portland Road in Wyke on a sunny mid-summer day. But I digress.

The scientists, led by Dr Kishalay De, have produced a report on some of their findings which makes fascinating reading. Well, the bits I understand do. I tried that and discovered that after getting down I needed thirty minutes to recover my breath before trying to stand again.

But on to further comforting news, about Mars bars. Quite fond of these in my hill walking days in icy conditions, because unlike many other such bars they do not freeze when the temperature drops below zero. Take one next time you climb to the dizzy heights of the Nothe Fort in winter. Then you won't starve if the St Bernard dog with the whisky barrel cannot get to you through the snow. But that's yet another digression. The point is, or was, that Mars bars, for years wrapped in plastic, will henceforth return to being covered in paper. Better for our planet and much easier to access. If you can't get the paper off, you can suck on it until it goes soggy and you get to the chocolate underneath. This couldn't happen with plastic.

And last but not least, yet another report informs us that Abbotsbury is the sunniest village in the UK with an average of 1,904 hours of sunshine and just 117 rainy days. As we are bound to share a lot of the same weather as Abbotsbury this is good news indeed. I do hope that this has made Mrs Barnacle happy. I apologise for starting with the story about sad events which will occur just a mere five billion years away, but I hope you agree much better followed. Easy exercises to keep you fit and prolong active life, great news about paper covered Mars bars and lovely weather in Dorset are just what the doctor ordered. So hopefully Private Fraser was wrong and we're not really doomed after all.

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The Floods of July 1955 On 18 July 1955, Dorset experienced a very rare and severe thun-

derstorm; a thunderstorm so severe it was one of the largest to have ever occur in England, the resulting floods affected many communities in Dorset.

In Osmington Mills, this very rare event caused water to run off the land causing a dam to burst. This resulted in water sweeping down the val-

ley; flooding properties, washing away bridges and widening the channel. For one resident living in a property next to the stream, they thought "It was the end of the world", as they took refuge on the first floor and saw trees being washed upright down the valley. Flooding like this is very rare; but there are many narrow steep-sided valleys in Dorset where, after very heavy rainfall, water levels can increase very quickly.

In Weymouth, Prim Hughes recalled to the Broadwey and Upwey Historical Society the moment the floods hit " During the afternoon of Monday 18 July 1955 it got very, very dark. By 4.00pm it was as dark as night and the rain started falling, continuing until about 7.30pm. Army lorries went up through Church Street shouting out 'don't worry if it gets any worse we're all ready on Dorchester Road to evacuate you. Children

thought it was quite exciting." Rose Amey's father one of many locals who went out to rescue people caught in the floods. "Father was friendly with the people who ran the Chipperfield's funfair. When the flood happened he pushed our small rowing boat up under the railway bridge to help rescue the women and children. For several days our house was full to the brim with people. The men at the fair stayed behind for a while to make the place secure and to rescue what they could. They had a monkey in a cage in the middle of the fair. They left it there, the rumour being that the takings from the fair were kept in the bottom of the cage. The monkey was not the most friendly animal and only the fair workers could enter the cage safely."

It's all about fingers

Well, here we are almost in the month of July and at the time of writing, I must say that the weather has been amazing with long hot, sunny days. Let's hope that it stays this way until December (that is almost Christmas - just a reminder).

The CO has been in training for Wimbledon, well, she has been getting strawberries ready, together with the Pimms. She's also been out in the garden with her racket smashing a tennis ball at the wall, much to the annoyance of Henry - not our cat but the neighbour, because the ball keeps rebounding off the wall and shooting over his garden. One particular afternoon the ball knocked his coffee off a garden table. He was not happy. But the CO flashed her blue eye at him (she couldn't flash the other one as the ball had crashed into it making it swell up.

I on the other hand have not been able to join in with this because I have had Trigger Finger:

'Trigger finger is a condition that affects the tendons in your hand. It can make it hard to bend your fingers or thumb. Trigger finger symptoms include, stiffness or clicking when you move your finger or thumb. It may also sometimes get stuck in a bent position. Treatments for Trigger Finger include painkillers, wearing a plastic splint on your hand, steroid injections and sometimes surgery.

Trigger finger can happen if a tendon or the area around a tendon in your hand becomes inflamed and swollen: (Info NHS)

My GP felt it would be helped by having a series of steroid injections. I had the first one in June and boy did I know it. It felt like the needle was six inches long and rather like a knitting needle. The pain was tremendous and I felt like shouting out loud, in fact I think I did. Following this, I thought it was over but, the doctor informed me that this was only the injection to freeze my hand and the real one was following when my hand had become numb. When it was, he produced another needle, similar to the last but about two inches longer. This was when I discovered that my hand wasn't

numb at all, the pain was horrific and I thought the needle had come out of the other side of my hand. After a short time, I was able to move my middle finger quite well but it was still a little painful. As the day went on, it felt better and I was able to move it quite well, which was a relief.

Prior to this time, I had to manage with my middle finger either refusing to open from my hand or with it sticking out straight with the other ones closed. This was quite embarrassing as, when I was driving - which was not easy - my finger remained sticking upwards and the other drivers must have felt that I was giving them a rude sign. Henry, from next door, actually mentioned this by stating that he took a dim view about me sticking my finger up at him. However, he was ok when I explained my condition.

This was not the case when I had a delivery from Amazon. The driver kindly carried the said parcel to my door and, as I picked it up he noticed my rude finger gesture and as he drove off, he did the same to me. I thought about reporting him but, realised that he had a point.

This condition is not easy and is extremely painful because the finger or thumb gets in the way when it is either closed or open. I did try to be excused the many jobs I was allocated but, the CO was not having any of this. She can be a right a slave driver at times. But, I did have my respite because, when I had the injection the doctor told me that I could do no heavy lifting for two days, in fact, better to have complete rest. I was overjoyed as I told the CO. I did though exaggerate because I told her it was two months. I did feel guilty about this and told her it was two days rest but, this could be extended to two weeks if I continued to be in pain. The CO settled for two days and moved all of my chores over to the day when I would be fit again.

I have got two more injections to have and when I see the GP again, I will ask him to give me a note explaining that I need a complete months rest. Do you think I will be successful? No, neither do I, but it is worth a try I think. Perhaps you could write in with a sympathy letter to the editor, explaining your concern about my condition and asking him, if he will consider giving a whole page to why the CO should be more caring in this case. That might just work. But spare a thought, it is very difficult to do some of the chores when you only have three good fingers on your hand to cope with. Perhaps, I need an outside carer, Kim Kadashian springs to mind. Then

again, probably not because I want sents you are going to buy. to live a little longer.

So that is mine and the CO's adventures this month. I hope the weather stavs fine for you. Make the most of it, as I said earlier, Christmas is not far off now. Time to consider what pre-

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Sutton Poyntz Village WI

On a beautiful sunny afternoon Gin was the popular topic for our meeting on 7th June. Ros Nelmes, one of the founders of Fordington Gin, came to talk about the production of their Nationally recognised awardwinning gin, made in their 'home grown' distillery here in Dorset.

Ros, an excellent speaker, talked about how every batch, and batches are quite small, is unique.

How at different times across the year, there are usually about nine different varieties but the gin Ros brought for us to have a taste of at the meeting was geranium, guite a new one which most of us agreed was very tasty.

Ros told us how gin has been a popular drink for hundreds of years, and in the distant past was often made in peoples own homes using almost anything edible with juniper, but these often almost lethal spirits were known to cause terrible drunkenness and damage to families. And so in the late 1700s it became illegal to produce gin except a very small number of very large distilleries that were registered and licensed, an enforceable situation that was maintained until 2001 when the law was changed so that small gin producers could apply to be registered. This change in the law stimulated many new names on the market, many new flavours, and renewed popularity and the introduction of the vast number of new flavours that are around today.

The big providers produce massive quantities, Gordons making 60 million bottles a week, whereas at Fordington they only make small batches, always handmade, always therefore unique, and only ever using a small range of wherever possible organic ingredients, like apple and blackberry and elderflower, either home grown or from local farmers.

We heard how it is that to ensure the content of the gin is as it should be in relation to alcohol content etc, HMRC have the right to call un-announced at any time of day or night to carry out checks. We also hear how heavily taxed gin is now and concern the Government having announced that soon there is to be a further tax increase.

There were of course a few mem-

bers who turned down the chance to have a taste but most enjoyed a very small geranium gin and tonic. I would like to reassure readers that there was no danger of members over doing it! The little medicine tots really did only provide a taster!

Overcombe WI

Our meeting in May was our belated Coronation Celebration and our 42nd Birthday Party. Many members came wearing their home-made crowns and wearing patriotic colours.

We were entertained by Sue from Snooks, Hatters from Bridport, ably assisted by her friend Sharon. Well, the merriment when we tried on the hats, from a pith helmet, through sun hats, to warm winter hats and frivolous wedding and Ascot wear.

Snooks was started in Bridport in 1896 by Tommy Snook and is alleged to be the largest hat shop in the country. In 1959 it moved, still in Bridport and was run, and still is, by his nephew Roger Snook. Sue explained that a Tilley hat, very popular these days, has a secret compartment for a key and paper money. It was first made by Alex Tilley in 1980 and has two straps as they were originally used for sailing. This prevented them being blown off. One story Sue told is of an elephant eating a Tilley hat, and it 'came out' 5 days later entirely intact! Sue was extremely knowledgeable and explained the difference between various hats, a trilby and a bowler for example. Gamekeepers wore top hats and in 1849 Edward Coke, younger brother of the 2nd Earl of Leicester found they were often knocked off during their work at Holkham Hall in Norfolk. He therefore commissioned an amended shape and height of the hat to relieve this problem, it was subsequently made by George and William Bowler. Hence its name. The trilby itswas originally made for women and owes its popularity to Georges du Maurier who wrote the gothic novel Trilby: the Panama hat, comes in various shapes and prices, hand woven In Panama from straw harvested in Ecuador. This is just a snippet of the knowledge Sue has, and she looks fabulous in all the styles, how lucky to be a woman who suits hats. The assistants in Snooks are known as Snookettes.

After this wonderful entertainment we enjoyed a glass of something bubbly and a slice of delicious Victoria Sandwich, a nod to royalty before going on our very merry way.

Your councillor update Weymouth Town Council

(Wyke Regis) and Dorset Council (Rodwell and Wyke Regis) Mayor of Weymouth Dorset:-

Today is somewhat grey and overcast but we have had some terrific weather recently haven't we? It has again been a busy month despite my resolution to take things easy.

Many councillors have received emails and letters from residents castigating us for our lack of action on the siting of the barge in Portland Port. Neither the Home Office or Portland Port consulted residents or Councils before agreeing to the barge being moored off our towns. Portland Port is a private company they do not need to consult, but since their activities have a direct bearing upon us it would be nice if they did. Subsequently they and the Home Office have held some public meetings. We have been assured that badly stretched resources will not be impacted by the presence of 500 extra people in the area. We have also been assured that all security measures have been taken. None of this is actually very reassuring and none of their arrangements makes it right to house refugees in this way. We have a proud tradition of being hospitable to those in need this is not the way to demonstrate it. Direct your emails and letters to the Home Secretary and to Portland Port, they are the ones promoting this as a good location and a good solution. Copy your MP who I know is not happy about this particular choice either.

On a happier note the regeneration work at Radipole Park Gardens is about to start. This has been a long project hampered by the pandemic, but WTC staff have worked hard behind the scenes and I just know you will be pleased by the results. Similarly Tumbledown Farm plans are progressing and providing another useful and rewarding green open space within the town. I was very pleased to attend a Civic Society Award ceremony recently where Tumbledown received a commendation for the work they have achieved

I have mentioned before that as a Town Council we in Weymouth are able to give much stronger focus to our community, to support local organisations and communities and generally enhance the feeling of well being and pride among our residents. The town has a community support fund that can award grants to local groups so do always check both Weymouth Town Council website and Facebook page as well as those of the organisations and groups that interest you.

Dorset Corporate Parenting Board, of which I retained chairmanship, received most of the annual reports at their most recent meeting and I am pleased to report that we have received good reports from Ofsted and our services are progressing well. The future of our young looked after children is so



important.

As part of my role as President of MV Freedom I attended the AGM and was pleased to learn that the charity is financially sound despite activities being curtailed during Covid, numbers of volunteers are being maintained and access to the water for those less able remains very important. The Charity is always pleased to hear from people wanting to come aboard as well as those who want to join as volunteers whether as crew, skippers or fund raisers.

Some of you may be aware that I accepted a nomination and was proud and honoured to be elected Mayor of Weymouth early in May. My deputy is ClIr Alex Furhamm, a local Wyke 'boy'. (I believe he has been in the horse trough – if not please do rectify that). I hope that with this range over the generations we will be able to achieve some good work.


