### The Wyke Regis Society WykeRegisSociety.org.uk Minutes of the bi monthly meeting held 7pm Tuesday 11th July 2023

at Wyke Regis Working Men's Club, Portland Road

Treasurer's Report: Met with Jeff Thomas regarding planting bulbs in the churchyard and awaiting response from Emiy Brown, Parks Department. Emily Brown met to discuss the small green at the rear of Wyke Square, which has been left unmown, and agreed to mow lower down and leave the top as wild flowers, to enable easy access for walkers and dog-walkers. Any information on suppliers of bird or bat boxes would be welcome.

Chairperson's Report: Our new website, WykeRegisSociety.org.uk, is up and running. lan, the webmaster, has included photos with captions but would welcome any further information about them.

Councillors' Reports: Cllr Helen

Toft reports the small footpath that led to the Rodwell Trail from Rylands Lane has now been claimed by Dorset Council although they have no plans for it. Nothing more can be done without a licence from DC. Ryemead Lane has a mass of uncut grass in the middle, this was blamed on broken mowers and should be sorted out soon. Wyke residents have been very active in filling in the Open Spaces forms to protect our green spaces from development.

Ryemead Community Centre needs Trustees.

A petition on the new car parking charges, which are much higher in Weymouth than elsewhere in Dorset (despite Weymouth being informed they were being 'harmonised') has been sent to Dorset Council.

Cllr Clare Sutton reported that plans are in place to close off Shrubbery Lane from Wyke Square. We do not know why Wyke was apparently not included in the list of 20mph areas recently. An Outreach is planned for Wyke Youth, presumably at the Gardens Memorial Hall: The hall is being well maintained.

Church: All Saints Church are running visits to the tower with the magnificent view from the top and the chance to ring a bell.

Wyke Square: The planters in the Square are still in need of some upkeep. No news on the conservation area bin.

Planning: It was reported that the developers of the Ferrybridge site are bankrupt and so work has stopped.

Curtis Fields - are now proposing no affordable housing on the site.

Footpaths and Highways: While we are supposedly celebrating the Jurassic Coast path, our section has been sadly left to fall into disrepair over many years. Despite very recent efforts to mend it, it is now so dangerous and overgrown that it has been diverted from Martleaves to Portland Road. From Martleaves Farm, trick cvclists and motorbikers use the approach and put dog-walkers and pedestrians at risk. The Rangers have been asked to reinstate the no cycling signs which were recently removed, along with the stiles (apparently to allow better disabled access, although at present it is difficult to imagine this is useful).

Air quality monitoring: We are still hoping that a group from All Saints School might find this an interesting project. Please contact the Society if this subject interests

Anti-social behaviour: Residents must report whatever problems they see in relation to drug dealing or any other anti-social behaviour, 999 for a crime in progress.

Parks and open spaces: Correction from previous minutes

Residents in Rodwell Road had been keen to upgrade the corner of Old Castle Road (with planting and wild flowers. The large green area has been left by Highways and has been very overgrown. The Council response is that all verges are left for wild flower and will be cut and raked twice a year. They hope that over the years the area will attract more wild flowers and insect life., but the area has been cut and left and the main things coming through are nettles and large docks. The Council seem to have taken little interest in the community spirit that was offered to improve this very prominent junction.

A broken seat at the top of Westhill Road has been replaced and is in use.

Camper vans have been using the parking area at the Community Centre in Ryemead Lane. The online review has been amended to show not suitable for camper vans to stay at, hopefully this will encourage them to find suitable paying sites.

The sewage farm had a power cut and consequently the smell and presumably discharge was really bad. SSE put generators in.

There was a vigorous discussion about the rights and wrongs of parking campervans on the road. Mr Chiverton Moore explained that his wife and daughter require his drive for parking, and that if the bus has any problems getting between his van and a car parked opposite, the driver is welcome to knock on his door for him to move

The Barge was discussed; apart from local health provision, doubling the number of those living on it (previously designed for 250 oil rig workers) troubled the meeting, as did the hothousing of 500 males.

### **Travel Vaccinations**

If you are thinking of travelling outside the UK, start preparing for your trip especially long trips, at least 2 months before you go. You don't always need vaccinations to travel abroad. If you do, the type of vaccination depends

on which country you're visiting and what you're doing. Not all travel vaccinations are free on the NHS, even if they are recommended for travel to certain areas.

We can offer an initial Travel Consultation at the surgery, where our Travel Nurse will advise you on the vaccines you need and whether these are available on the NHS and at the surgery.

You will be given written information on what vaccines are advised and the cost of each dose or course. For vaccines not available on the NHS, you will need a private consultation at a private travel vaccination clinic or a pharmacy that offers travel healthcare services.

Please be aware that some of the vaccinations require more than one dose and some do not become effective until several weeks after the injection.

Please contact reception to book your initial travel consultation appointment where your risk will be assessed, and plans made for any vaccinations if needed. For further information and advice visit Travel Vaccinations - NHS.

### **Chasing Hospital Referrals**

We are aware that some NHS referrals currently have a long waiting time.

Please contact the hospital department directly for information on what the waiting time is. Your GP is not able to expedite or chase your appointment.

If your clinical situation changes considerably whilst you are waiting for your appointment, please keep your GP updated.

### **Check Your Test Results Online**

If you have had blood tests taken at the surgery please check your results online, either via the NHS App, Airmid or SystmOne. Your GP will comment on the results and any further action that may or not be needed.

Checking your blood results online instead of telephoning the surgery helps to keep our phone lines free for other patients.

Please ask at reception if you require your username and password to access online services.

### **Appointments**

The NHS strategy is to get general practices working more closely together. There are now appointments (GP, nurse, and other clinicians) offered by the Weymouth Locality. This means you could be offered an appointment at an-

other GP surgery. Initially this is a Saturday morning service, but this may develop in time.

### Prescriptions - the Electronic Repeat Dispensing Service (ERD)

Some patients who are on less than 6 regular repeat medications are being switched over to a new Electronic Repeat Dispensing service (eRD), which allows your GP to send a series (usually 6, 9 or 12 months) of repeat prescriptions to your chosen pharmacy all in one go. Your pharmacy will then dispense the medication monthly or 2 monthly to you over the next 12 months.

Switching over to eRD prescriptions means you do not need to put in a request for your medication each month, just visit your pharmacy to collect your medication.

NHS England recommends GP practices use eRD, as it has shown this reduces ordering problems and queries for patients, prescription signing workload for GPs, medicines wastage, and facilitates the dispensing process for the pharmacies.

We are gradually switching suit-

able patients over to this service. Patients who are suitable will be informed, and a letter sent explaining the process.

This system is only suitable for patients on regular medications, that are not likely to change in strength or dose over the coming year. It is not suitable for medications that are taken as and when needed, controlled drugs, or short-term medication.

If you have not been switched over to the eRD process, you will need to continue to request your medication each month.

The GPs deal with many serious conditions and situations on a daily basis, from severe mental health crises, heart and lung conditions to new cancer diagnoses and caring for patients at the end of their lives in their own homes. So, even if reception and the waiting areas look empty, there is plenty more going on behind the scenes.

There are record-high waiting lists for surgery and hospital appointments, and people who may have been put off coming forward for healthcare during the pandemic are now reaching out again. Adding into this a cost-of-living crisis that is having a dire effect on people's mental and in some cases physical health.

GP practices are at times facing unmanageable demands. Please be patient with the Practice

### Trading Standards News

Artificial intelligence and scams

Artificial intelligence (AI) uses computers and machines to maximum advantage to mimic the problem-solving and decision-making capabilities of the human mind. Businesses and government organisations around the world

are racing to figure out how to make the best use of this technology.

Al has already helped:

Doctors analyse patient data, identifying health risks, developing personalized treatment plans and speeding up the development of new treatments.

An application that translates expressions on faces into sound to help people with visual impairments 'see' the emotion of the person they are talking with.

Research into bee populations, vital for our planet and food supplies, by analysing worldwide data from hives fitted with internet sensors, microphones and cameras.

However, Al can also be used negatively. Scammers and fraudsters can use Al to better trick people out of money. Using technology, they can pretend to be genuine businesses, change their voice to sound like someone they are not and to fake customer reviews on retail websites.

Enforcers and regulators are taking steps to come to terms with the Al challenge.

In the UK, the Government has proposed that AI must be used safely, be technically secure and function as designed. It must





Restoration Work in Progress

### **Sunday 2nd July 2023**

Following six years of extensive restoration work, St Andrew's Church is now fully restored to its former glory, even the colour scheme following research by professional conservationists 'Humphries & Jones', very much reflects the warmth and beauty of years past.

Normans in about 1367, and stands on a site that has presented

pathway and entrance with Victorian lamp standards lining the entrance way, a new roof, substantive external repointing and stone replacements, and then finally, the internal restoration, from new wall linings, plastering, fabric and stone repair, and very sensitive redecoration.

The service of rededication was

conducted by the Team Rector, Revd James Menzies, with readings taken by Councillor Kate Wheller the Mayor of Weymouth, choral singing by the St Andrews Choir accompanied by the church musicians and led by Ginny Croad, and church organist John Tallon. At the end of the service, Harry Barnes on behalf of St Andrews Church presented flowers to Simon Crumbleholme, whose longstanding local family construction company had undertaken the contract work throughout the various stages of the restoration and, Peter James of Crickmay Stark Ar-

chitects based in Dorchester, who

prepared the detailed specifications, contracts and, oversaw the programme of work.

Following the service, a reception was held in the Church Rooms where a celebration cake, provided by Jules Howard, was formally cut by the Mayor Kate Wheller.

To round off the occasion, Harry Barnes gave an interesting multimedia presentation on the history of the church, an overview of the various stained glass windows within, the monuments and tablets, and how some of the more turbulent years such as the Reformation and the Commonwealth had shaped the 600 year old church, into what it is today, and still at heart of Christian worship within the Preston community.

As one of the several local Councillors attending on the day put it, 'truly a glorious day of celebration, and one to be remembered'.

### **Historical Overview of St Andrew's Church**

St Andrew's was constructed in around 1375 AD. It was preceded by a smaller Norman chapel on the same site and, there is significant evidence to support the claim that an Anglo-Saxon church preceded them both.

The first recorded Prebendary was James de Vercelii, in the year 1226. Whilst the fundamental architecture is of Norman construction and design, significant enhancements during the 15C and 16C witnessed the introduction of several Gothic overtones.

The initial construction was in all probability based upon the previous design architecture, that is say a simple nave with no separate sanctuary, The altar situated in the east elevation with no concept of a chancel. The original font (still in use today!) situated at the entrance of the church as part of the traditional Pascal journey, and in lieu of a formal traditional baptistry.

In the 15c when the sanctuary and narthex were added, we see the introduction of the first Gothic style overtones, typical of the Medieval era, and never better exemplified than by the substantial pointed archway let into the east elevation wall to provide a spacious and imposing entrance to the newly added sanctuary.

It is interesting to note the position of the altar tightly against the east elevation such that the priest had his back to the congregation hence no one could actually witness the details of the Sacrament, unlike post Reformation altars. Also, the introduction of the hagioscope (squint). This provided vision of the host being elevated during the Sacrament for those not permitted to enter the church, such as lepers or undesirables, hence they are also known as leper windows or lynchnoscopes. When the south arcade was added, the hagioscope no longer




provided access from outside the


In the 16c, we see the removal of the south elevation wall and the church further extended creating the south arcade, again with characteristic Gothic pointed arches. The tower was added, and the west elevation wall given way to a most impressive example of Gothic archways, to mirror the 15c chancel archway.


So today, our church stands firm

to the Glory of God, despite the ravages of time and even the forces Cromwell and Iconoclasm in 16c, evidenced throughout the fabric of our church, and with God's Grace, will stand testimony to His Word, for countless more generations to come.



have appropriate transparency, an identified legal person responsible for it, and its use must comply with future regulatory guidance. Within the European Union research is being carried out in various industries to attempt to create a thoughtful approach to

rules, but at the same time some member states, such as Italy, have taken a firmer approach and have currently banned certain AI applications altogether. Similarly in the US, the Federal Government is assessing the impact of AI, while some states are looking to draft rules quickly.

Locally, the best kind of protection against scams and fraud is to be aware of the risks, be aware of the warning signs, and to spread the word about what to do if you become affected by scams. ### Citizens Advice

**Q** My children are starting new schools in September, one in primary and the other secondary. Between uniforms, PE kit and catching the bus each day the costs are adding up and I'm not sure how to cover it all. Is there any help I can get?

A The new school year puts pressure on lots of budgets but there is help available. A good place to start is the Citizens Advice website where you'll find lots of information on the support you might be entitled to for school-related

The help you can get to cover school lunches will vary depending on how old your children are and if you claim benefits. Children in Reception, Year 1 and 2 automatically get free school meals. You can apply for free school meals for older children if you claim certain types of benefits, including Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support.


If your child can't walk to school because of special educational needs or disabilities they should get free school transport. You may be able to get help with transport costs from your Local Education Authority if your children can't walk because it's dangerous or too far. Your LEA is part of your local council that deals with education in your area. Contact it directly to find out exactly what support it

If you're on a low income, your LEA may Be able to help with activity and school uniform costs. You're likely to be considered to be on a low income if you get means-tested benefits like Universal Credit or Housing Benefit. There may also be a local charitable scheme that can help. A good place to find out about these is the school itself or Parent Teacher Association (PTA) both will usually know if these kinds of schemes exist.



Four organisations which Traidcraft helped to set up are Transform Trade, the Fairtrade Foundation, Café Direct and Shared Interest. They all came out of the early Fairtrade movement and now continue to support the future of ethical trade by proving that business can be done in ways which nourish people and protect the planet we all rely on. There are an increasing number of suppliers of Fair Trade products in the UK and while we use only a few of them we are always open to suggestions and introducing different ranges to the shop.

Transform Trade continue to work with ethical producers to help them enter the UK market and work towards achieving Fairtrade status. They have been given the right to use the brand name 'Traidcraft' and are hoping to reintroduce some of the best-loved Traidcraft products, including tea, which would be welcomed by many of us, but especially the tea producers! Plans are still in the early stages but there is some

hope for the future. They are also planning to produce their own range of Christmas cards which should be available shortly so look out for them in the shop.

### Your councillor update Weymouth Town Council

(Wyke Regis) and Dorset Council (Rodwell and Wyke Regis) Mayor of Weymouth Dorset:-

It is difficult to get a balance in these articles between informing you of Dorset Council news, Weymouth Town Council news or what the Mayor has been up to (or boring you to death). I hope many of you will log on to either my Cllr Kate Wheller Facebook page or the Mayor of Weymouth Facebook page or the Mayors Blog via Weymouth Town Council for more of this news.

The question of the barge to house asylum seekers rumbles on. The refit seems to have taken longer than expected and cost more than expected. And you will be aware that despite a few men being moved in they were then removed for health reasons. I am pleased to see that Richard Drax MP continues to speak in the House on the subject, (I suspect he and I are not looking from the same angle) I don't know how much notice is taken and it is a shame that other Dorset MPs are not more supportive.

As we feared the Powerfuel planning application has gone to appeal and so that is again an issue threatening our health and well being.

The lack of accountability of Wessex Water and others is rightly causing a lot of concern. Before my health scare I was an all year round sea swimmer myself. It is extraordinary to think that WW was borrowing money seemingly to pay shareholders but not to repair the infrastructure! Now they suggest they will borrow more to do the repairs and charge us more! I have received a number of complaints about the smell of effluent from the Wyke Regis sewage works, living in Wyke I am aware when it is a problem myself. I have spoken to Wessex Water, who are aware. Please continue to report direct to them.

Post pandemic the ward work load continues to be very heavy, if I have not responded to your email I hope it is not because it has slipped through my net, so do resend if too much time has elapsed. I always respond. The lack of affordable housing, always a problem seems to have escalated. I wish I could help everyone who emails or phones. I can't magic up houses. Dorset simply does not have enough homes, and yet we

continue to build homes that will clearly become second homes for wealthy out-of-towners or those wishing to increase their holiday cottage portfolio. I hope that Dorset Council will support moves to add a council tax premium to homes not used as prime dwelling. There are, of course ways to manipulate this but it would be a start.

Car park charges were the subject of debate at the last Dorset Council meeting and a petition was presented by Weymouth residents and supported by Weymouth Town Council. It was agreed that there would be discussions in September, too late for this season. At the time of local government reorganisation (2019) one of the aims was that services, fees and charges would be harmonised across the Unitary Authority. I was naively optimistic that would happen. Now, suddenly that aspiration seems to have been abandoned in favour of charging over the odds for parking in some locations. This irrespective of the impact on local people, predominately low waged or retired, and scaring away visitors. Having a huge impact upon businesses who are struggling to survive. I am hopeful that now that other tourist areas eg. West Bay are complaining we might be listened to.

We have also become less tolerant and less considerate since lock down. My mail box is full of complaints about loud music, dogs barking and most of all cars blocking driveways and access to homes. There isn't very much I can do other than offer sympathy, but if you recognise yourself a little bit you could make a difference.

I recently attended a meeting to discuss regeneration of the Ryemead Lane Community Centre. This is a lovely hall, with a field and parking. They have a mother and toddler group, bingo, table tennis and other clubs, but there is the potential for so much more. The centre always hosted a thriving lunch club. The residents, led by former and much loved late Cllr Jim Churchouse, raised funds and established the centre. Those remaining are anxious to retire. We are looking for new younger trustees and committee members. Could this be you? You don't need to live in Wyke Regis and you don't need to have a loads of time; just a little. Many hands make light work. If you are interested please contact me in the first instance. There will be an AGM in September more details to follow.

This will be one of the facilities I will be supporting during my Mayoral

I was very pleased to cut the ribbon on a new NHS Research Hub located in Linden Court at Radipole Lane. They will be undertaking trials on new vaccines initially but will build up to trials on other drugs and research into the histology of many other diseases. This is an exciting project working closely with other units around the country. Quite a coup for it to be located here bringing real jobs to the area. Please go on line to find out more as they are keen to recruit volunteers to take part in the research.

All services once provided by the NHS, indeed I worked for the school dental service! But sadly no longer covered. They are visiting Weymouth once a month, staff come from across the south west but local professionals are also volunteering their time. I was pleased to visit the unit when it was parked up outside The Lantern. I was able to talk to the patients and thank the volunteers.
