Minutes of the last meeting:

Were read to be correct although a couple of items needed clarification: The cut through from Shrubbery Lane to Wyke Square, discussions on closing it to traffic are in its infancy but locals in Wyke seem to feel it should be closed to all traffic

The man who owns the camper van that is parked in All Saints Road would like us to state the following: 'At no time did he state he could not put his camper van on his drive, he needs to give his neighbours access to the garage that is a holiday let.

Membership:

No new members

Treasurer's Report:

The HSBC take £5 per month out of the account. Any suggestions for an alternative would be welcome.

To commemorate the Coronation of King Charles 111 the WRS felt if would be good to plant more bulbs in the Church vard on the corner of All Saints Road. Some years back the WRS and residents purchased and planted the daffodils with the assistance of Parks Dept. This time we thought that Camassia, Dutch Iris or Alliums would be nice as they would follow the daffodils in flowering. The WRS has approached the Church gardeners regarding this project and they are very keen.

Chairperson's Report:

The Society's new web manager has created a new website, address given above. It looks very good and he has included a lot of the Society photos, some of which had no reference, so he would welcome any help on this.

The picture boards left by Margaret Fitzpatrick have been photographed and put on memory sticks but the originals need going through, the Chairperson and Treasurer plan to do this.

The planning application for the incinerator on Portland was refused, the company has now appealed to the Secretary of State. We understand that no new evidence will be taken into account. As the Jurassic Coast extends 5km inland I wonder how the incinerator was even considered.

Wessex Water state that they are happy with the sewage disposal plans for the new builds on Lanehouse, etc., but with revelations about discharges this is a cause for concern, especially with the current government plans to allow even more discharges for building sites.

Councillor Report:

No Councillors attend this meeting. Cllr Helen Toft got together a small team of volunteers to tidy and clear the small footpath that led to the Rodwell Trail from Rylands lane. This has always been a 'no man's land' with the council abandoning it. Since the tidy up the Council have taken this area into their maintenance. Well done, Helen. Items discussed at the meeting will be passed onto the Councillors for their attention.

Memorial Hall:

All seems okay with the hall. It had been suggested that a better covered area at the back of the hall that leads to the toilets would be desirable. This has been put to the Church Warden.

Church:

All Saints Church had been running visits to the tower, this has proved popular with the magnificent view from the top and the chance to ring a bell. They are booking the visits again this year. The wall surrounding the Church has been hit twice by vehicles and now has two large gaping holes in it. The Council has paid for the repair in the past but now feels it is not their responsibility, the wall belongs to the Church. A change at this junction which would move the Church wall back seems to be the obvious solution. It is almost impossible for the very large lorries to negotiate this corner without hitting the wall. This area is a real accident 'black spot'.

Wyke Square:

A resident has tidied up and replanted another one of the planters in the Square, a donation of £7.50 was given towards the fresh compost. Some of the planters in the Square are still in need of some up keep. Perhaps you live in the Square and you might like to brighten things up a bit by caring for a planter.

A bin store overhanging the public highway in Shrubbery Lane has been reported to the Highways Dept.

The little green area at the back of Lymes Close has been mown and the cuttings collected, a third of the area is set aside for wild flowers and grasses. This seems to have worked well., a small area under the trees by the footpath we have asked to be left wild. The Council has tried to reduce the wild leek that is taking over in some places. There are constant complaints about the waste bins and motor bikes on the public path in All Saints Road, please contact the Council Highways Dept or Waste Management if this is causing you a problem.

Many residents were sorry to see the 9-9A bus service taken out. This leaves Lanehouse area with no bus, very sad.

Planning:

There have been no new planning application on the web site for Wyke.

Footpaths and Highways:

The Society has contacted the Council and the Rangers about the problem of small motor bikes and cyclists using the footpath along the Fleet. This is now in the hands of the Councillors but we have asked again to have signs reinstated along the footpath. It is sad that the footpath at the back of the holiday camp has all fallen away near Ferrybridge. The footpath has been rerouted onto the Portland Road but walkers are still climbing over the old footpath which is in a dangerous condition with repair and drainage needed. DCC no cycling signs are at Martleaves but not along the rest of the path.

Councillors have called for some safety improvement to local roads, mainly the mini roundabout at all Saints Church/Wyke Road, Asda Junction and Portland Beach Road

A concern has been raised about the new junction at the bottom of Lanehouse Rocks Road. Cars are parked opposite the middle white cross hatching which leaves little space for traffic to manoeuvre round the keep left sign. With the size of the lorries using this road it is an accident in the making. It is also mentioned that the filter lane at the traffic lights is hardly wide enough, considering the size of the lorries now using this road. The Society will contact Highways on this. Please contact the Dorset Highways department if you feel this junction is now not fit for purpose.

The yellow lines have been put in place outside the Smugglers Pub. The yellow lines give the traffic more space to pass stationary buses, and give a better traffic flow but cars still seem to park there on the yellow line.

Air quality monitoring: A group from the Scouts have shown an interest in this interesting project. Please contact the Society if this subject interests you.

Anti-social behaviour:

Again, residents have reported the problem with drug dealing in the area. This has been reported to the Police. Problem areas still seem to be Wyke Gardens, Crab House

at Ferrybridge, and the Rymead Fields near the Wessex Water site around the emergency exit areas. Residents must report whatever problems they see in relation to drug dealing or any other antisocial behaviour. If the problem has been moved on at Ferrybridge then the problem will turn up somewhere else.

Dog fouling in the area is a constant nuisance. Please report any person you see not picking up after their dog.

Parks and open spaces:

The Smugglers Hotel on Portland Road are doing well, residents have remarked on the small sitting out area that is a good use of the space. As we say so often, try to use these local venues or we will lose them.

The Society has contacted the Parks Department regarding the little orchard off Rymead Lane. They are trying to make it a wild flower area. It is a difficult area as there is still a lot of tarmac under the soil that was left by Wessex Water. The small fruit trees were put in and seems to have grown despite all the odds. The area will be cut and collected again this autumn with the hope to put in more wild flowers next spring. Feel free to sprinkle your wild flower seeds

in this area. These small 'green lungs' are very important to the community and we want to keep them

Post meeting note:

Camper vans have been using the parking area at the Community Centre in Rymead Lane. A notice has now gone up to point out there is 'No Overnight Camping'. Please let the Society know if you notice any overnight camper vans in your area.

A pop-up camp site has appeared in Pirates Lane, a great concern was the amount of rubble being taken onto the site presumably for paths for campers. Landowners are now allowed to run popup sites for up to 50 pitches for 60 days without full planning permission. Prior notice is required and dates set out for provision of waste disposal and toilets. The location must not be within the curtilage of a listed building, within the SSSI or on a scheduled monument. A similar scheme on Portland was deemed in breach of the Habitats Regulations and an enforcement order was made to close it.

The sign has gone up for the sale of land at the bottom of Camp Road, this is beautiful pasture land

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that belonged to Manor Farm. Hedges on neighbouring fields have been grubbed up, against current advice.

Evening walkers have reported seeing fishing with nets on the Fleet. This has been reported to the authorities.

The state of the Fleet area is of grave concern. Chairperson will contact Dorset Coast Forum for a presentation at the AGM.

It has been noticed that there are more bats around the area at night. The thought is that they are looking for a new home due to their habitat in Curtis Fields being taken away. A bat box for the little green behind the Square is being investigated.

The 'Wyke Pong' seems to be much improved. Wessex Water say there was an electrical fault and the generator that they use is not so efficient. Also, the extra lorries now using the site means the door are open more often. Please contact the Society if you feel it is still a problem. The emergency exit has not been cleared and the orchard is not being maintained. Meeting closed at 8.15pm, next

National Churches Trust

The roof at All Saints Church in Wyke Regis, is at risk of lifting and being blown off. Interim measures of securing the cladding with sandbags have only

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been partially successful, with water and rain causing extensive damage to the building.

The church hosts essential local services, such as a warm space during the winter for those who cannot afford their heating bills in the current cost of living crisis. The church also runs an after-school club for children to learn bellringing.

Failure to repair the roof and tackle the water damage threatens the remarkable roof structure of this Grade I listed building and could make the building unusable, scuppering the support it currently offers the local community.

Thankfully, help is on hand. The much-loved Dorset church is to share in a £473,750 urgent funding pay-out from the National Churches Trust.

A £15,000 National Churches Trust Grant will help to pay for urgent roof repairs to ensure the church can stay open and thrive. The church also receives a £5,000 Wolfson Fabric Repair Grant from the Wolfson Foundation, on the recommendation of the National Churches Trust.

Claire Walker, Chief Executive of the National Churches Trust, said: 'I'm delighted that the National Churches Trust is able to support All Saints church with funding for urgent roof repairs. This will safeguard the unique heritage of this ancient and historic church and keep it open and in use for the benefit of local people.'

Whether seeking quiet reflection, access to community services or a place to worship, the National

Churches Trust helps hundreds of churches each year and with the support of local people, keeps them open and thriving."

Paul Ramsbottom, Chief Executive of the Wolfson Foundation, said: "As well as being places of worship and buildings of beauty, churches sit at the heart of the community. In many ways they stand between the past and present. We are thrilled to continue our partnership with the National Churches Trust to support the preservation of these significant, much-loved historic buildings across the UK.' Anthony Shearman, Fundraising Volunteer at All Saints Church,

'Having nearly exhausted our external fundraising options over the last two years All Saints was delighted to receive the generous National Churches Trust grant, which put us with touching distance of the total funds required.' 'By repairing the North Aisle roof, the problems affecting the areas under the roof will be removed immediately increasing the church's pew capacity. Also, it will allow us the opportunity to put the North Aisle to better use by designating spaces that can be safely and comfortably be used for activities, such as meetings, community events, and various outreach initiatives. This will ultimately help to promote a vibrant church, sensitive to the needs of the parish and hopefully contribute to a sustained increase in the congregation.'

How the grant will help the church The funding will facilitate to stop

damp in the North Aisle roof structures, North Aisle and North Nave walls by replacing the roof after rectifying all underlying design defects and previous faulty work. More about All Saints church

The build of the parish church of All Saints' was completed and consecrated in 1455. The list of priests goes back to 1263, therefore it is likely that there was at least one earlier building on or near the present site.

All Saints' is Grade Listed. Pevsner's 'The Buildings of England' describes the church as 'important' and 'impressive'. Also, it is an important example of the perpendicular style of architecture and is still essentially the building as was completed in the fifteenth century.

Of interest, high on opposing central pillars, facing each other across the central nave is the sculptured heads of Henry VI, King when the church was built, and his Queen, Margaret of Anjou.

The 'Corbel Heads' in the south aisle are all of the early English period and mainly of secular subjects. In the south aisle is the Corbel of a workman carrying a hod and gives a good idea of the dress of the times. Another, situated by the tower arch, represents a dog with a bone in its mouth. It is thought to be Norman and probably the only evidence that a Norman church once stood on the site.

Significant help for churches Thirty-three churches across the UK will stay open and in good repair thanks to £473,750 of funding awarded and recommended by the National Churches Trust in this latest round of grants. 
Sutton Poyntz Village WI

It all came down to mum and dad paying so, out came my card and after a very costly fee, we were back on the road to Ilfracombe. We had to drive by the broken down car on the way, so we stopped in a lay-by and my son in law walked back to put a notice on the inside of the windscreen saying he would recover this the following Tuesday. Eventually we arrived at our destination and we were so relieved. The CO felt we needed a cup of tea and some food before we went to find the hotel, so we headed to the Pavilion.

To give you some background on Illfracombe, I dug this from the Wikipedia site:

Ilfracombe is a seaside resort and civil parish on the North Devon coast, England, with a small harbour surrounded by cliffs. The parish stretches along the coast from the 'Coastguard Cottages' in Hele Bay toward the east and 4 miles (6 km) along the Torrs to Lee Bay toward the west. The resort is hilly and the highest point within the parish boundary is 'Hore Down Gate', 2 miles (3km) inland and 860 feet (270m) above sea level. The landmark of Hillsborough Hill dominates the harbour and the site of an Iron Age fortified settlement. In the built environment, the architectural-award-winning Landmark Theatre has a distinctive double-conical design. The 13th century parish church, Holy Trinity, and the St Nicholas's Chapel (a lighthouse) on Lantern Hill, have been joined by Damien Hirst's statue of Verity as points of interest.

Ilfracombe has been settled since the Iron Age, when the Dumnonii (the Roman name for the inhabitants of the South-West) established a hill fort on the dominant hill, Hillsborough (formerly Hele's Barrow). The origin of the town's name has two possible sources. The first is that it is a derivative of the Anglo-Saxon Alfreinscoma - by which name it was noted in the Liber Exoniensis of 1086. The translation of this name (from Walter William Skeat of the department of Anglo Saxon at Cambridge University) means the 'Valley of the sons of Alfred'. The second origin

is that the name Ilfracombe was derived from Norse illf (bad), Anglo-Saxon yfel (evil ford) and Anglo-Saxon cumb (valley) perhaps from a Celtic source (compare Welsh cwm), thus 'The valley with the bad ford'.[2][3]The manor house at Chambercombe in east Ilfracombe was recorded in the 1086 *Domesday Book* as being built by a Norman knight Champernon (from Chambernon in France) who landed with William of Normandy.

It is also said to be haunted. I felt this would be a nice place to take the CO, but decided against it. We went to a Wild Life Park nearby instead.

We eventually arrived home safely on the following Monday.

We saw my son in law's car still parked on the grass verge and all seemed well, so we decided to come back the next day to tow it back home.

We are going back again this year, in fact, at the time of writing, we are going in a few days. All will be well I am sure, but if we are not back by the next issue, we may have been kidnapped by pirates on the high seas. The CO is insisting to put a parrot on her shoulder just in case.

Citizens Advice

Q. As winter is approaching I am getting more and more worried about my energy bills. What can I do to try to keep them down?

A. Small changes can make a big difference when it comes to saving energy. Citizens Advice has teamed up with Energy Saving Trust to share advice on getting help if you are struggling with energy bills and tips on how to cut energy costs around the home.

Washing clothes at 30°C could save around £15 per year and reducing the number of wash cycles by one per week could save a further £15.

Reducing shower time to four minutes could save a typical household as much as £75 a year (and why not switch off the shower while you are soaping up?).

Putting only the water you need in the kettle could save around £12 a year on electricity.

Draught-proofing windows and doors will help your home feel warmer and could save around £50 a year on bills.

Turning appliances off at the wall/plug when you're not using them could save an average of £60 a year.

Turning the thermostat down by 1°C could save around £115 a year. However, lifestyle changes won't be possible for everyone and may not be enough to cover the hole in household budgets caused by higher prices, so check you're getting all the support you're entitled to. This could include:

Checking what benefits you're entitled to by using a benefits calculator such as www.entitledto.com Warm Home Discount - a £150 annual discount if you get certain benefits.

Cold weather payments - payments if you get certain benefits and the weather is extremely cold. Grants from your energy supplier to help you pay off debts you may

pendable broadband service that will support the UK for decades to

The Local Government Association (LGA) says the change will be straightforward for most people. However, they have warned that criminals are using misinformation about the switchover to confuse people vulnerable to scams.

The LGA says people who use healthcare telephony devices are particularly at risk of being targeted by scammers, who trick victims into disclosing their personal and financial information over the phone. Around 2 million people use these devices across the coun-

The switchover is free of charge and councils and their homecare alarm providers or contractors will never ask for personal or financial information over the phone.

The LGA says it has seen reports of fraudsters calling people claiming their bank details are needed as part of the switchover or their service will be disconnected. It has also received reports of residents being contacted over the phone by callers claiming to work for the NHS, asking for their personal information.

The LGA expects scam attempts to increase as the switchover date nears. In addition to phone calls, criminals may create phishing emails and fake websites to try to obtain peoples' personal data.

Telecoms providers such as Virgin Media, O2 or BT should contact customers before the switchover to check in to make sure their service isn't affected.

Anyone with telecare services should check how the switchover will affect them, and what they need to do to be ready, so their care isn't disrupted.

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Building Resilience

Since covid I have received many requests for help from adults and parents of children/young adults who are having difficulties and feelings of anxiousness following personal experiences of the pandemic. To ensure my helping strategies are appropriately informed I have researched several models of resil-

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Tel 07742563293 katehoulding@yahoo.co.uk www.kathrynhoulding.co.uk ience in the hope that I might gain deeper understanding of the fears and anxiety associated with trauma and be more fully equipped professionally to support those affected. I don't think it is too strong a statement to say that everyone will during their lifetime experience a deeply distressing or disturbing experience or physical injury that will leave them feeling traumatised.

Resilience is described as an individual's ability to cope with trauma, adversity and hardship measured by how quickly they recover or 'bounce-back' to being happy and successful after something difficult or bad has happened. It is accepted that there are four main types of resilience Physical, Mental, Emotional, and Social and very often how a person behaves following a traumatic event may indicate where gaps in their resilience might lie.

Many theories and models support professional helping strategies. Seligman's 3Ps positive psychology framework model – Personalisation, Pervasiveness, and Permanence – refer to three emotional reactions that we tend to have to adversity (1). The five R's of energy resiliency - Robustness, Redundancy, Resourcefulness, Response

and Recovery are important attributes of withstanding, responding to and recovering from disruptions (2). Dr Arielle Schwartz's 6 Pillars of Resilience - Satisfaction with Lifestyle (people who lead a satisfying & fulfilling life tend to cope better with stress & adversity). Supportive Relationships. Physical Wellbeing. Solution-Focused Coping. Emotion-Focused Coping. Positive Beliefs (3). Dr Ginsburg's 7 C's of resilience that together allow a child to show resilience in the face of life's challenges: Competence, Confidence, Connection, Character, Contribution, Coping, and Control

As a holistic practitioner my helping strategy will vary person to person utilising a range of approaches and skills depending on individual need. Identification of the trauma trigger is a good place to begin the process however this will very much depend on the nature of the trauma. Some may have great difficulty putting past hurts into words and whilst talking therapies are frequently used as a stand alone method of support. I have found that integrating Diet/Nutrition, Homoeopathy and Clinical Reflexology most effective.

With the aim of re-balancing the sympathetic and para-sympathetic branches of the autonomic ner-

vous system to ease the physical symptoms associated with trauma Clinical Reflexology encourages the individual to feel relaxed, safe and secure. It is recognised that when relaxed many find it easier to share feelings, sometimes tears

Readers will be aware of my mantra that there is a symbiotic relationship between physical and mental/emotional pain. So in easing the physical symptoms of trauma the mental and emotional symptoms ease and vice versa bringing about balance and positive behaviour change. Whilst some naturally have a built-in resilience others can learn behaviours that build resilience.

Kendra Cherry MSEd in her Everything Psychology Book provides 10 ways to build resilience - Finding purpose, believing in yourself, developing a social network, embracing change, being optimistic, nurturing yourself, developing problem-solving skills, establishing goals, taking action, committing to building skills over time (5).

From a personal perspective as a free spirited great grandma, I feel blessed to be naturally resilient apart from my 'gap' and am about to address this by going on a restful nurturing spa based break.



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

Your article in issue 390 of the Register Magazine on the Green Woodpecker was interesting.



also ground feeding. These were presumably from the group we had seen earlier. I guess this was a bumper year for breeding.
