May marked a year since the last local elections and it's been a privilege for us all to serve you. It has certainly been School fete season with Cllr Peter and Joanna Dickenson and myself attending St Andrews school fete and Bincombe Valley school fete which were extremely busy.

I attended Bincombe Valley myself so it's always nice to return and for Cllr Peter Dickenson as the former lollipop man it was a similar feeling returning back to St Andrews. We'd like to thank the PTFA of both schools for their work. Another well attended event was the coffee morning in aid of Bowel cancer at the Sutton Poyntz Misson Hall organised by Hilary Davidson. This raised a staggering amount for a worthy cause.

Apologies: J. Hamdorff, I. Cox, M. Holdaway, K. Holdaway Minutes of the last meeting: read to be correct but next meeting date was incorrect.

Chairperson's Report: As we had no quorum and no councillors there was a general discussion. It was pointed out that the low turnout could be due to three different dates on the last minutes. As no comments had been received about the proposal to change to quarterly meetings, the next meeting was set for two months' time as usual. Hopefully we will be able to discuss the AGM minutes more fully then, with feedback from councillors.

No news to date on the incinerator, but 150 shipping containers are being installed next to Starbucks at Osprey Quay, for what purpose is not clear.

JH reports that the Chickerell

Camp have done a great job repainting the railings at the War Memorial.

Planning: it is understood that the Methodist Hall conversion is on hold because of access problems. The Society along with many residents had rejected this plan on the grounds of no adequate parking and over development of such a small site.

Ferrybridge Footpath: Members report diggers and earthmovers in operation at the site. We hope this will give better results than when the scrub was previously removed.

Pirates Lane: No news, although the owner is believed to have sold a plot and is installing structures, and has done the same in other

AOB: Kitchen equipment and single duvets would be welcome at the Lantern containers at Mount Pleasant. We had just heard that a suspected murder had taken place there. It was unclear from the report whether the new influx of travellers was involved.

Wyke Regis Medical Centre/Lane-

house/Chickerell was discussed,

with all members having recent negative experiences. According to the latest CQC report in 2022, when WR came almost bottom of the patients' poll, and they were rated in need of improvement, they had 6 doctors for 15000 patients (50% more patients than the average), 4 Nurse Practitioners, 3 Nurses, 1 Paramedic, 1 Mental Health and 4 medical assistants. WR web page now reports 2 doctors, 2 locums, 3 NPs, 2 Paramedics, 4 Nurses and 2 Healthcare Assistants. They also report 7 Practice Managers, 7 Admin Secretaries, 1 Prescription Manager and 6 Reception staff. I can only speak from personal experience, but I worked as an admin secretary for 4 doctors and it was just me, part time. And I covered another practice when necessary. We also had one Practice Manager who covered both practices with one Administrator for each. How can it be efficient to have so few doctors and so many administrators? It is unclear how we reclaim a good service, as CQC are aware of the fall in standards since 2018. I can only assume all those support staff are needed to answer the vast number of complaints they must be getting.

Meeting closed at 8.15pm. Next

Hedgehogs are nocturnal, coming out at dusk to forage and

find mates. Most hogs out at the day without an adult. night are absolutely fine and should be left alone. If you see one on a road or pavement, it as possible. Please do not put it may 'freeze' when a threat such as cars or humans approach.

Unless obviously injured, move it to the verge or pavement to go safely on its way. But most hedgehogs out in the day are in trouble newspaper or an old tea towel to and need to be rescued. The one exception is an adult moving with purpose. It might be a mum nest building, foraging or taking a break from her family, or one that has been disturbed and is seeking safety.

A hedgehog needs help if it is: Injured or in distress.

Lying out in daylight (hedgehogs don't 'sunbathe').

Wobbly or walking unsteadily (a sign of dehydration or injury). Trapped in netting, in a drain or

Surrounded by flies or covered in fly eggs.

pond.

Being attacked by dogs or birds.

Hoglets are squeaking or out in

If you find a hedgehog in need, ask a rescue for advice as soon under bush or wait and see for a day or two. And please don't try to look after it yourself. Wearing gardening gloves, pick it up and put in a high sided box with torn hide under and contact a rescue straightaway. The sooner it is in the care of an experienced rescue and give help, the greater its chances of survival.

Purbeck Shuttle 200 Summer Bus Service 2025

The shuttle bus to RSPB Arne, is now in its fourth consecutive

year, has been renamed to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the modern railway, thus Purbeck Shuttle 200 and includes The Blue Pool, Purbeck Park and Norden Farm Campsite.

The trial shuttle bus service originally set up by the RSPB to connect Wareham train station and RSPB Arne Nature Reserve has been extended to cover the period from 28th May to the end of August 2025 on a two day a week service on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

The main objective is to provide a sustainable public transport link from Wareham Station to the RSPB Arne Reserve, The Blue Pool Nature Reserve and Purbeck Park connecting with the Swanage Heritage Railway, thus reducing road traffic especially during the main summer season. This also enables links with walking and cycle hire for visitors staying within the region. No bookings needed, just step onboard, enjoy the journey, and experience the outstanding scenery within Purbeck's internationally recognised heathland.

This we hope will establish a regular service now this is becoming known to locals and tourists alike and a growing expectation the bus will be there this summer. This is particularly useful for those without access to a car and is also beneficial for local people coming into Wareham from the outlying parishes acting as a rural transport hub.

The project is supported and funded by the Purbeck Community Rail Partnership, Dorset Council's Community Transport Fund, RSPB Arne, The Blue Pool, Wareham Town Council and operated by Dorset Community Transport. Steven Booth, Purbeck Community Rail Officer said "We are so pleased to be involved in this project working with our partners as it supports our aims and objectives to promote sustainable integrated transport by linking the railway and bus to Purbeck's most picturesque attractions. RSPB Arne remains one of the few places in the UK where all six of the UK's native reptiles can be found situated on Poole Harbour and within the Dorset Natural Landscape area. In addition to this the popular natural tourist attraction, The Blue Pool Nature Reserve, situated in the tranquil scenic surroundings of a former clay mining pit can also be reached for the first time by public transport.

Tim Christian, Dorset Community Transport Manager, said: "We're delighted to offer the continuation of the shuttle bus through the summer period. This is a valuable service for those who can't drive or don't have access to a car to be able to come and visit RSPB Arne and the Blue Pool and connect by rail. Whether visitors choose to leave their cars at home, don't have access to a vehicle, we hope our Purbeck Shuttle 200 service will enable more people to enjoy these major Purbeck attractions, experiencing wonderful wildlife, and stunning views.



Senior Citizens are always ready to acknowledge that they are never too old to learn. Unfortunately, understanding what we are being told, and remembering it afterwards is a little more difficult than it used to be, but we do have to try and keep up. Indeed, it is essential, for in today's fast changing world, if we don't keep up then we are left behind. A long way behind.

In our grandparent's time, and even in our parents' days, this was not too serious as things changed very slowly. But now however, we are expected to use increasingly complex IT equipment to perform simple tasks such as paying for our tea and biscuits in a cafe. And while doing so to avoid being scammed by unscrupulous thieves, expert enough to fool even our largest banks, who should know better. This is why a Senior Citizen is advised to set aside a period of time every day to learn at least one new piece of information. Sometimes this time of day can coincide with an overwhelming desire to nod off, but attempting to complete a General Knowledge crossword usually helps maintain alertness levels.

My In-house Adviser vouches for this approach. Sadly the prize crosswords have become so much harder nowadays, probably because anyone can cheat by looking up the answer on the Internet. Before the Internet we had to cheat by looking up the answer in an encyclopaedia or Thesaurus. So now personal and local 'general' knowledge is not enough. A good example is a recent crossword clue which asked for a ten-letter word meaning 'Someone who stares at canals'. Now Dorset is not overly blessed with canals.

About 200 years ago the Dorset and Somerset Canal was planned and construction started. Unfortunately after about eight miles or so the company ran out of money and despite the name, none of those miles were within Dorset. However there was a canal that opened in 1841 near Lytchett Bay in Upper Hamworthy, to transport clay to Poole Harbour, but archaeologists Keith Jarvis and Alan Hawkins, who discovered this, found that the only bit of the canal that survives today is a muddy water-filled area about 10 metres wide near Upton. This means most Dorset folk cannot claim any great

knowledge of canals, little or no experience of staring at them, and no acquaintance with the sort of people that like to stare at canals. There has never been the need for such a word in this fine, almost canal-free county. And to save Mrs Barnacle of Wyke the trouble of having to look it up on Google and emailing me with the answer, the word is a gongoozler. No doubt when you read gongoozler you said to yourself 'Of course it is, how silly of me not to remember it, or words to that effect. Fighting Back Against Scam Mail

In an age where internet scams dominate headlines, it's easy to forget that traditional postal scams still pose a serious threat, especially to people more reliant on letters through the post.

That's why the return of the SCAMnesty campaign by the Friends Against Scams, and National Trading Standards Scams Teams, is both timely and vital.

SCAMnesty invites people across the UK to send in any unwanted scam or nuisance mail, completely free of charge, to help investigators disrupt fraud. The process is simple: just drop the mail into an envelope and send it to NTSST, FREEPOST, MAIL MARSHALS. No stamp is required.

This campaign will be running throughout the Summer, but you can send post to the Freepost address at any time.

Postal scams come in many forms: fake lotteries, bogus health cures, clairvoyant promises, and investment traps. They often use official-looking seals, urgent deadlines, and personal touches to manipulate recipients. The goal? To extract money through deception, often targeting older or isolated people.

What's most alarming is that only 5% of these crimes are reported. Victims often feel ashamed or unsure of where to turn. But the truth is, these fraudsters are professionals. Falling victim to their tactics is not a sign of weakness, it's a reflection of how sophisticated these scams have become.



Poet, Priest & Author

Hi there, I hope you're enjoying the sunshine (written early June). Well it's been a busy one where we have been busy in the garden (well, I've been busy under the supervision of the CO). Grass, hedges and borders have all received attention and, I am now replacing some glass panels in the greenhouse that got blown out in the last storm that we had. I needed to cut some glass but couldn't find my glass cutter.

I asked the CO if she had seen it, and she told me that she had put it in a safe place. I asked her where but she couldn't remember. I wanted to say that she's always doing that, but I decided against this as I got 'the Look.' Therefore I bought a new one and it is now in my safe place.

I was strolling through Dorchester quite recently and found myself looking at the bronze statue of William Barnes outside St Peter's Church. This led me to do a little digging into his past. He was born in 1801 in the small village of Bagber not far from Sturminster Newton. The statue outside the church, shows him in clerical dress as he was often seen as he walked to his little school just a hundred yards away in South Street. Barnes was a learned man which included being a writer and poet, a priest, a mathematician, engraving artist and an inventor.

Barnes was the author of 800 poems, his most famous one being,

Linden Lea and even though a generation older, was friends with Thomas Hardy who admired his flair for the Dorset dialect, which Barnes loved writing in.

He worked in Dorchester as a solicitor's clerk between 1818 - 1823 before moving to Mere where he opened a school. This is where he started writing his poems in the Dorset dialect which was so loved. He also studied many languages. In 1835, after marrying a Dorchester girl - Julia Miles, he moved back to the county town where again, he created a school, firstly in Durngate Street and then on to South Street. After another short move in South Street, the school became a neighbour of an architect's practice in which Thomas Hardy was an apprentice.

In 1847 Barnes was ordained as a priest after taking a BD degree in Cambridge and after various curacies at Whitcombe Church. He eventually became rector of St Peter's Church in Winterborne Came. He served there until his death in 1886. Shortly before his death, he was visited by Thomas Hardy and a friend, Edward Grosse. In a letter, Grosse wrote that Barnes was dying as picturesquely as he lived:

'We found him in bed in his study, his face turned to the window, where the light came streaming in through flowering plants, his brown books on all sides of him save one, the wall behind him being hung with old green tapestry. He had a scarlet bedgown on, a kind of soft biretta of dark red wool on his head, from which his long white hair escaped on to the pillow; his grey beard, grown very long, upon his breast; his complexion, which you recollect as richly bronzed, has become blanched by keeping indoors, and is now waxily white where it is not waxily pink; the blue eyes, half shut, restless under languid lids.' The Life of William Barnes(1887) by Leader Scott, p. 325,

I have often photographed the

statue of William Barnes, not really knowing much about him. Also, I have spent much time along the narrow lane through Winterborne Came. It is brilliant for wildlife and photography, with sightings of deer, sparrow hawks, buzzards and the odd grouse. I have also been mesmerised by the hares boxing together along the road. It is a lovely part of the world, a little narrow for the car but worth it when you see an old Oak tree surrounded by RapeSeed. It makes the eyes pop.

Once, the CO and I were walking with our King Charles dog, Alfie who is no longer with us. We decided to walk around the huge Rape Seed field and Alfie decided he was going to investigate. He raced into the field and was gone for ages. The CO began to become anxious and went in there herself to try and find him. All I could see

was the Rape Field and the CO's head just popping out. After no joy, she came out of the field and then there was a loud rustling where we were and a deer shot out of there followed quickly by Alfie. He had obviously found this and wouldn't leave until it moved. It frightened us both but is a lovely memory of Alfie.

Well, summer continues and let's hope it continues to be a good one. After months of rain and heavy winds, it is so nice to be able to get out in shorts and t shirt. But, I feel I must remind you to shop early for Christmas. It's not far away now, those long gueues are waiting for us and you'll thank me for reminding you, I know you will. Have a great July and I'll see you all again in August.

The Landowners had cut their wages and Dorset workers were the lowest paid in the Country at that time. Unfortunately for them it was against the law to form such a society and swear an oath of allegiance, so they were arrested and tried. The jury was made up mostly of Landowners in the area and their relatives, so they received an unfair trial sentenced to seven years and penal transportation to Australia. This caused an outcry around the country as it was thought of as a very harsh sentence and so in 1836 they were pardoned. There is today a Shelter in Tolpuddle erected in 1934 near to the Sycamore tree that the men used to meet under. A Rally is held every year in the third week of July and

features a parade, there have been many famous speakers at the Rally for instance Tony Benn and Billy Bragg. We thanked Brian for a most interesting talk then we closed the meeting as usual with our popular Raffle.

We have been asked by The Sutton Poyntz Society to join in with their quest to put on a Poppy display in the village, knitted, crocheted or made from felt Poppies are all welcome. 
Portland and Weymouth Towns of Culture continues. Do watch out for the various events, there is bound to be something that will peak your interest. W are blessed with enormous talent locally

A Clinical Reflexology case study: Vestibular Migraine.

I was contacted by Mr A who had been referred to me, asking if I might help him manage a complex range of on-going symptoms. Aged in his sixties with a demanding and stressful job and following bereavements he began to experience sudden and fleeting feelings of unwellness and weakness.

Following many GP visits and blood tests that yielded no significant results, he was referred for further tests and numerous scans and consultations with a Hospital ENT consultant and a Neurologist. The result was a di-

agnosis of vestibular migraine. According to NHS Southampton University Hospital a vestibular migraine, or migrainous vertigo mainly presents with dizziness and/or balance symptoms that affects approximately 40% of migraine patients. Other symptoms may include weakness, nausea, vomiting, blurred vision, flashing lights, fatigue, irritability, difficulty concentrating, poor sleep. The exact cause of vestibular migraine is unclear however, research suggests vestibular migraines, like other migraine types, tend to run in families (genetic link).

According to Mersey Care NHS Foundation Trust some researchers believe that an imbalance of chemicals in the brain, such as serotonin, may contribute to the development of vestibular migraines. Other triggers include changes in female hormone levels

experienced at puberty, pregnancy and menopause and for some patients, environmental factors like weather changes, noisy overcrowded and unfamiliar settings. computer screens, lighting in supermarkets, shops etc. dehydration, motion sensitivity, tinnitus or sensitivity to sounds and a lack of Vitamin D. According to Healthline certain foods and drinks, such as caffeine, alcohol, processed foods, and aged cheeses can be a trigger. The most common triggers are stress, anxiety and fatigue. Keeping a diary will provide insight of frequency and intensity of episodes and may identify an individual's trigger.

At Mr A's initial appointment as with all new patients, a full case history was taken including past medical history, physical and emotional traumas and current prescribed medications. Collecting and recording this information is necessary to comply with my governing body professional code of conduct, illustrate best practice and quide treatment. We discussed treatment options and Mr A decided 'to give Clinical Reflexology a try'. During treatment Mr A shared the emotional stresses he had experienced in the last few years, his experiences of loss, and how his anxiety had worsened since diagnosis. I explained how when feeling anxious or stressed (shock/trauma), the hormones adrenalin and cortisol flood the system activating the sympathetic branch of the autonomic nervous system, blood is quickly diverted from the extremities (arms and legs) to the vital organs in the centre of the body in order to sustain life. Raising heart rate, blood pressure and pulse rate. Symptoms of weakness in the legs, shallow breathing, giddiness and light headiness, sweating, dry mouth, urgency of the bowel or bladder, nausea, vomiting, shaking and feeling faint are a some of the symptoms felt when experiencing the 'fight or flight' response.

The areas of sensitivity on Mr A's feet included the solar plexus (or celiac plexus, a nerve centre in the abdominal area responsible for normal function of abdominal organs) adrenal glands (or suprarenal glands found on the top of both kidneys responsible for adrenalin and cortisol production), muscles of the neck and shoulders and head area (cranial nerves). After treatment Mr A felt more relaxed, less tense in his neck and upper back, head clearer and breathing easier.

Next appointment Mr A. Feed-

back included that his legs had felt less weak when increasing his dog walking, improved sleep and benefit from treatment. He revisited his GP and medication dose had increased. Mr A continues with Clinical Reflexology noting that the days of feeling unwell have lessened, there have been few blips triggered by stress or anxiety. I have continued to focus treatment on calming and rebalancing the autonomic nervous system whilst supporting the somatic nervous system. We discussed the importance of diet and how by keeping a food diary, identified triggers can be eliminated and replaced with alternative foods. My conclusions drawn from many years of experience advising on elimination diets is chocolate, cheese, coffee, oranges, MSG and E numbers are the most frequently identified migraine triggers closely followed by pork and processed meats.

NHS Southampton Hospital website offers further dietary advice and suggests that the lack of food or irregular meals, dehydration, alcohol, caffeine and the food additives (monosodium glutamate, aspartame, tyramine or nitrates) as well as some sleeping tablets can also trigger a migraine. Solar savings for Dorset's highways

We are feeling the benefit of the sun, after installing solar panels on our highways depots in Charminster, Ferndown and



That splendid, uncompromising pile of brickwork presented on the cover of the March 2011 Wyke Register pleased me immensely – chiefly because Wyke came so close to losing it some years ago, and if it had not been for some fancy footwork by the Protection Society it would have been demolished and some pretty "town houses" (pretty horrible and out of place) built there instead.

I cannot supply dates, but there must be a lot of people now who do not know the story. First of all,

Trinity House no longer needed the lookout, and sold it. An enterprising pair decided to use the compound for a vehicle repair works, and rigged up lighting on the tower so that they could do this noisily at night, much to the annoyance of residents. Eventually I think the Council told them this was no place for a business of that nature, and it was sold on. The next we knew was that it was proposed to build the town houses mentioned above, and I remember seeing an architect's drawing of a row of houses with garages under, and balconies for owners to look out over Wyke Castle, Red Lane ("Pirates Lane") and the green fields of the Heritage Coast down to the Fleet and the sea beyond.

There are details of this story that I realise I do not remember, but the Protection Society tried in vain to get the lookout listed. I do not recall why its sale went back to Trinity House, but it did, and they put out a notice that prospective buyers should send in bids - with the money - for the property. One of the Protection Society's members, Ted McBride, had done some careful research on the lookout and discovered that it was the only example in England that had the coastquard cottages adjacent to a lookout, forming a complete

little complex. So, after some careful discussion, the Society decided to bid for it, although its own regulations did not permit it to own property. Accordingly, we made a derisory bid for it, which we guessed would be rejected, and sent it off to Trinity House with Ted's research papers. It cost the Society £10 for the Banker's Order accompanying the bid. As expected, this was refused, and so was the only other bid sent in. The Society's Treasurer restored the money to the Society's funds, and we heard no more - until the report of some visitors from London talking about the listed lookout. Nothing was said to the Society; obviously Trinity House had read and reacted, and had done just what we had hoped - listed the building, but not of course, the modern cabin built within the walled compound.

It was bought by a man involved in building 'Spinnaker View' alongside Asda. Then someone passed me word that the expression, "There are more ways than one of demolishing a listed building," had been heard, and advised me to look round the back. So one evening I squeezed through the wire mesh frame put there to keep people out, and looked about. There is a door to the lookout, facing away from the road. It was wide open, and looking a little weatherworn. No wonder! From the gap between step and doorstep a little tree was growing, an elderberry. I know elderberries grow quite quickly, but this one must have been there for more than a year. It was tall enough just to touch the lintel - probably six feet - and it looked very strong and healthy. I photographed it and sent the picture off to the Conservation Officer.

Not surprisingly the lookout came back on the market, and this time was bought by a sensible local. What intrigues me now about this tale is that so much happened behind the scenes, things that we were never told about. The Protection Society must have been cursed, praised, and cursed again, but we still have the lookout tower complementing Wyke Castle on Westhill Road, and all for the cost of a Bank Draught - £10.

Well worth it.

Since the installations in 2022, we have saved approximately £54,000 a year in energy costs and significantly reduced our highways team's carbon emissions.

"Even with the relatively small solar panel installations at the three depots combined, we are generating enough energy to power the equivalent of 77 average-size homes a year.

"This renewable energy, which costs nothing to generate

at the three sites, is used to charge our equipment and growing electric vehicle fleet, and help power our buildings. "We are committed to helping build a greener, more sustainable future for our county and it is fantastic to see the positive impact these solar panels are having on our carbon footprint and the council's energy bills." To meet our carbon neutral target, Dorset Council needs to move away from using fossil fuels (like oil and gas) to heat and power its buildings

To do this we need to improve the energy efficiency of our buildings, replace all oil and gas heating systems with low carbon alternatives, and generate any energy used from renewable sources.

Over 750,000 kilowatt hours (kWh) of electricity has been generated so far from the solar panels at the three depots. Excess energy generated by the solar arrays is fed back into the national electricity grid.




