Chairperson's Report

Wyke Clinic staffing problems Chair wrote to CQC, who are making enquiries. It had been reported that the new owners of the practice also run other practices which have been found unsatisfactory.

Weymouth and Lyme Bays water quality

Chair wrote to Lloyd Hatton MP, as it appears cruise ships visiting Portland Port are responsible. There is also at present an offline water monitor which has previously discharged into Weymouth Bay near where the Esplanade meets Greenhill.

Transport

SW Trains were renationalised on 25th May and will become SW Rail. There are new First Bus timetables but only late-night additions for Wyke. Their timetable unreliability was remarked on by several residents.

Dorset Coroner's Report on Wooland/Chamberlaine Road accident Response to request for further information from Dorset Coroner - Further to your recent email, I write to confirm that as there was a criminal trial the coronial investigation was suspended and has not been resumed. All of the evidence that explained how Sylvia Bentley died was aired in the criminal trial. There was a request to fund signs at Woolands/Chamberlaine Road junction but it was not felt to be

users of Pirates Lane and has

brought in army trucks to his field. Police are reported not to be taking action. If people are being put in fear of their safety, that is AS-SAULT and is a criminal offence. If police are failing to respond to reports of intimidation, the victims should email the Dorset Commissioner for Police with a complaint. That is what he is paid for.

Councillor Wheller has tried to interest the Council officer, who claims this is not a public right of way and appears not to want to get involved in the matter of Hunt occupying the barn against regulations. However, the footpath has been used for over a hundred years. Are we seeing again the failure of the Council to register footpaths as required some ten years ago? Chair to contact Cllr Taylor on this.

Planning

The Court building, Portland Road - still no news from Council, who have lost the keys. It was suggested they should call a locksmith. lan Cox still hopes to use it as an artist's base. Chair will contact Councillor Taylor on this.

Methodist chapel, Portland Road - no news

Lower Bridge Farm on Mandeville Road - 50 tents applied for July-Sept.

Councillor Wheller was not available for comment on planning.

The news that the incinerator planning appeal can go ahead was welcomed. We wondered - given the poor use of existing incinerators, and possible new regulations to discourage incineration - what the Langham Estate hopes to get out of this development.

Councillors' Reports (HT, CS, TT)

Work to restore public access along the coast path north of Ferrybridge was completed last month thanks to close cooperation and cost-sharing between Chesil Vista and Dorset Council's Greenspace Team. This has been a while coming but is great news for local residents and users of the South West Coast Path from further afield. Some glitches were anticipated partly due to the nature of the site but work on remediating these is in hand.

There is currently a Project Initiation Document submitted to full council for initial review and Weymouth Town Council has agreed to a Public Consultation on 20mph in Weymouth, Cllr Taylor will apply for Wyke if this goes through. In August Dorset Council will hold a travel consultation which residents need to engage

to the clothes we discard.

Everyone deserves affordable clothes - but not at the cost of communities overseas or a plasticchoked planet. Perhaps if clothes weren't produced at 'throwaway prices' we would go back to buying for quality, choosing natural fibres and making our clothes last. Many clothing items are designed to be worn just once or twice, before being thrown away. Whilst charity shops provide a much needed way for clothes to be reused and recycled many are inundated with clothes they are unable to sell and tons of clothing ends up being sent to Africa. Ghana, has become a 'fast fashion graveyard' with 15 million items of discarded clothing dumped there every single week. Shamefully, the UK is the biggest contributor. Clothes made by companies like M&S, Primark, and H&M, to name but a few, are often made of plastics like polyester. Polyester will take centuries to degrade into harmful microplastics, or worse, if it's burned, releases toxic chemicals that put people and nature in grave danger.

The good news is that governments are currently in talks to agree to a Global Plastics Treaty, which could force countries and companies to radically reduce their plastic production and pollution. Greenpeace have launched a petition demanding a strong Global Plastics Treaty, to end irresponsible, polluting fast fashion? 

read - was my birthday. When this was mentioned to a friend she asked, 'Is it a significant birthday?' Now your view of these events may be different from mine, but any Senior Senior Citizen - as defined on the 'Over the Hill' (OtH) scale of wisdom - regards every birthday as significant. It means that you have reached it, a significant triumph. The day itself was celebrated by lunch out with four generations of the family present. The variety of good wishes that you receive at such times is a testament to the ingenuity of those around you. Cards arrived through the post, all well before the day itself as most people had taken account of the fact that the Royal Mail can be a little slow in meeting its obligations. Others came by email, WhatsApp, Text, other electronic means and personally to the door, all more prompt than the postal service.

write, not your yesterday as you

They also demonstrated some of the artistic talents of those friends whose abilities have been more than proved over the decades. A good example is John - his real name as there are quite a number with that name in the world or even just in Weymouth, so using it doesn't trespass on his privacy too much - who is a photographer of note. He always delivers a hand-made card with an appropriate photo and caption. This time the photo was of yours truly wearing sunglasses and a Pith Helmet - don't ask -with the caption Pioneer Gongoozler. Thus proving, amongst other things, that at least one person reads Over the Hill. And if you don't know what Gongoozler means then you haven't been reading the right columns. But I digress. Age is of course subjective, with Goliath becoming a first-time father at one hundred and thirty-five years old. This Goliath is not the biblical character but a Galapagos tortoise who lives in Miami Zoo. which occupies 750 acres on an island just off the Florida coast. My experience of Miami is limited to a one-week business trip when it was so unseasonally cold that they were burning tyres around the lemon groves to try and keep the frost from ruining the crop. It was very cold, made worse because my

packing had included only warm weather clothing. Equally sadly the grading on the OtH scale of wisdom only goes up to a century so Goliath is well over the top of that. And before Mrs Barnacle of Wyke ation might be reconsidered.

Anyway, by my calculations Goliath won't get me a mention. was hatched in 1890, which begs the question of where he lived for the sixty years before Miami Zoo was founded, albeit then under another name. Goliath and his partner Sweet Pea, who is over 30 years younger, were introduced to their offspring but showed little parental enthusiasm as in the wild parents never see their tortoise youngsters, who are left to fend for themselves. It was a sight and sound that brought back memories, for there were still lots of them flying in the years before my teens. But that's another digression.

One of my birthday traditions has embraced a bit of sea water swimming on or near the day itself. Specifically, a swim out from the pebbles to the rafts at Greenhill. And back again of course. Climbing onto the raft offers time for reflection, to meditate on the meaning of life, to muse upon the passage of time and importantly, to have a long rest before swimming back. Now, in their infinite wisdom and concern for our - or is it just my? wellbeing the powers-that-be have removed the rafts. This poses a se-

rious problem, for if I attempt my usual yearly routine then I could end up, some days later, off the coast of France having not found a raft. For Wevmouthian Mervyn Sharp, a past 'King of the Channel' and the first person to complete seven crossings this would not be a problem. I met Mervyn some time ago, he was a lovely modest man always generous with his time for good causes. The Guiness Book of Records reports that he is the first person to cross the English Chancomplains, there are no plans to nel in every way possible - swimadd further gradings. But when - if ming in it, boating across it, flying - I reach the top spot then the situ- over it and by Euro Tunnel under it. I can claim three of those, but that Thankfully, my Junior In-house Advisor produced a solution. She has just completed a one-mile open water swim around Burgh Island for the Chestnut Appeal Charity, and she trained in her swim pool which allowed her to swim against a current. She produced a small wooden model of the raft, tethered it to the end of her swim pool and I swam against the current to reach it. Couldn't climb aboard of course. but I could float back to the other end, so the tradition has been maintained. In answer to the original question, it has definitely been a significant birthday.

Green Councillors Update

Working Together for Wyke and Rodwell

Updates from your Green Councillors: Cllr Claudia Webb, Cllr Helen Toft & Cllr Clare Sutton.

Over the past few months, your local Green councillors have been working hard across Rodwell and Wyke to address residents' concerns, support community projects, and plan for a more sustainable future.

Cllr Claudia Webb: Supporting Residents and Green Spaces Councillor Claudia Webb has continued her long-standing collaboration with the Friends of the Rodwell Trail, meeting with Dorset Council greenspace officers to plan improvements to trail gardens, wayfinding signage, and community planting schemes. Her focus on environmental stewardship remains a cornerstone of her work in the ward.

In response to infrastructure issues, Claudia was credited for helping to facilitate the reconnection of lighting at the Dorset Council offices car park—an improvement that's made a practical difference to local safety and

accessibility.

Much of Claudia's time this summer has also been dedicated to supporting residents who have contacted her about planning objections, overdevelopment, and local environmental improvements. Whether offering guidance on proposed building conversions or helping neighbours navigate the planning system, she remains a highly responsive voice in the community.

She is also working closely with the local dog warden to tackle dog fouling in the area—an issue frequently raised by residents. The approach has focused on better signage, educational messages, and targeted enforcement in known hotspots.

Cllr Helen Toft: Tackling Parking Problems and Looking to a Greener Future

In Wyke, Cllr Helen Toft has been addressing the increasing issue of inconsiderate parking, especially around the Whitehead Drive estate near Smallmouth Beach. Visitors often park on corners or pavements, blocking access for mobility scooters and pushchairs. Helen has received numerous requests for new double yellow lines and is working with the Council to build the case, though she notes that traffic regulation changes are a slow but necessary process.

Helen encourages residents to report blocked access to Dorset Police, as these reports help build the evidence base for long-term solutions.

Looking to the future, Helen recently helped interview candidates for a new Sustainability Officer post at Dorset Council—an important role in the Council's push toward reaching net zero by 2030. She's optimistic about the impact this position will have on local environmental policy and community engagement.

Cllr Clare Sutton: Footpath Access, Community Safety, and Youth Opportunities

In June, the Ferrybridge section of the South West Coast Path was officially reopened—thanks in part to the persistence of Dorset's Greenspace team. Cllr Clare Sutton continues to work closely with the team and local landowners, as parts of the area remain vulnerable to shifting ground and require further mitigation.

Other recent casework has included tackling littering, dog fouling, timing of traffic lights, and antisocial behaviour. Clare reports

that Dorset Council staff have responded swiftly and helpfully to all concerns raised.

In her role on the Children's Services Cabinet, Clare has also been involved in championing the Pineapple Project, a community initiative aimed at helping young women and girls feel safer in public spaces. The project delivers school education, outreach support, and a quardianship scheme involving both individuals and local businesses. You can find their pop-up gazebo along Weymouth seafront during summer fireworks nights. Clare was also delighted to attend the STEPS Club for Young People annual awards on 31st July. As a former member and long-standing trustee, she spoke warmly of the club's youth workers, facilities, and programmes—including a dance studio, sports hall, and Friday music project. The club reopens on 1st September and welcomes all young people aged 13-19 on Mondays and Wednesdays. Working for You



Where it all began

It was the Autumn of 1980 and things in my life had begun to go haywire. After being a busy Regional Manager of a company dealing in garage and motor equipment, I was made redundant. The company had been taken over by our American competitors and we were all given a month's notice.

Not long after that, I was taken ill with what was initially felt to be a stroke. However, it was determined that it was a bad case of Bells Palsy. My face was all twisted, my nose flat against my left cheek. My right eye wouldn't close and my mouth was slanted against my nose. I couldn't eat or drink properly and to talk was extremely difficult. I looked like a monster out of Dr Who. The CO has just said that I had always looked like that. Thanks for that. I was put on steroids and had to attend Blandford Hospital daily to have electrolysis treatment in order to attempt to coax my face to return to normal. None of this worked.

After about 3 to 4 months there was no change and my GP told me my face would probably stay this way. I had no job, no prospects, I was ill and couldn't speak properly. No one wanted a Quasimodo type in their company. I became depressed and closed down on most people, I could see no hope at all.

One day, the CO went to work and I was left at home. The kids were at school and I tried to cheer myself up playing my guitar. That lasted about a minute - I just had no motivation to play a note. In the quiet of the house, I heard a voice within myself. The voice said, 'Say a prayer and I will heal you.' The voice kept saying this for the biggest part of the day until I thought I was mentally ill. I told the CO when she came home at lunch time and she said, 'Perhaps it's God.' I had never believed in such things so I ignored this. But as I went to bed that night, I heard the voice again, 'Say a prayer and I'll heal you'. I was so low in mood and replied in a sleepy voice, 'Ok, heal me,' and I went to sleep.

The next day, I got up and I felt strangely better. I could whistle, something I had not been able to do for some months. I went into the bathroom and as I looked in the mirror, I noticed that my face was beginning to go back into place. I was elated but confused also. I went to my hospital appointment later that morning and was told that I need not come again, my face had all returned to normal. I didn't know what had happened; all I knew was that a voice - God? - had asked me to pray to Him; I had and now, all was ok.

A neighbour in our village knocked on the door and told us both that she had heard that something had happened to me and as she looked at me, she began rejoicing. I was embarrassed but as we talked, I realised that Jesus Christ had healed me. What the health authorities couldn't do, He did overnight. That day in September 1980, I became a Christian and the CO soon followed me as she had a spiritual experience in the local church a few days later.

This all happened 45 years ago and we are still going on living our lives for Jesus. We're not religious fanatics, we've just realised that there is more to life than we had before. The CO still says that I'm 'a little fat bloke' but these days I am known as 'the little Christian fat bloke'. Yes our lives have changed much for the better and we have found Jesus' help so strong at times. He has healed us both; supplied extra needs when we have been on slippery slopes and He continues to bless us every single day. Don't get me wrong, we still have our bad times, argue and disagree on a lot of things. But now, we have a third person - Jesus Christ - helping us through difficult decisions and guiding us in the right direction. Through Jesus we now have eternal life. This means that when we die and our life is over. we continue in heaven, eternally. Without Him, we would have had nothing. This is the true meaning of Christianity. Jesus died on a cross for each one of us. He took our sin upon Himself and everyone who believes this and asks Him to forgive them for their sin and invites Him into

their life, receive Him. He makes each one of us brand new. I know there are many questions that can be asked about this, 'If God is good etc..then why does He allow etc..' The answer to this is, I don't know but, what I do know is that the CO and myself belong to Jesus and to the best of our abilities, will continue to serve Him.

We're nothing special; as I said earlier, we are not religious freaks, we are Christians and have found true happiness and life in Him. He has changed our lives and He can change your's too, if you ask Him. All you have to say is:

'Lord Jesus, Please forgive me my sin. Please come and live in my life, fill me with your Holy Spirit and help me to live for you. In Jesus' Name. Amen

If you said this prayer, you are a Christian. Find a church, get yourself a modern bible and take it from there.

Trading Standards Counterfeit pet medicine

A cat named Smokey nearly lost his life after being treated with a counterfeit flea product bought online. The counterfeit product was a copy of a genuine and widely used 'Frontline' tick and flea treatment. The packaging itself looked legitimate but inside was a toxic insecticide that led to emergency surgery. Smokey survived, but his story is a warning to pet owners everywhere.

The Intellectual Property Office is warning that criminals are increasingly targeting pet owners through online marketplaces. In fact, over 18,000 illegal animal medicines and supplements were intercepted last year alone. A recent survey revealed that 60% of buyers were influenced by ease of access in buying online, and 72% wrongly believed the quality of counterfeit products would match the real thing.

Pet owners, beware: counterfeit pet medicines including flea treatments are being sold online and they could make your pet seriously ill. These products are untested, unregulated, and potentially lethal. One pet owner described a fake treatment that smelled like white spirit. Others have reported spelling errors and poor-quality packaging. Both reports can be clear red flags that something isn't right.

So, in general terms, how can you protect your pet?

Buy only from trusted sources such as licensed vets, pharmacies, or reputable pet retailers.

Check the packaging - look for spelling mistakes, poor print quality, or unusual smells.

Be wary of large price discounts - if the price seems too good to be true, it probably is.

Report suspicious products - contact Trading Standards if you suspect a fake.

The roof may have holes in it, and the once straight ridge line may now sag with age. Only hints of colour may show that greying old boards once felt the stroke of a paint brush. It's probably been decades since the last cow looked out the door at what was then a barn yard that was an integral part of a working family farm. It would be wrong to think that old farm buildings no longer serve animal needs, though.

and animals, some that were welcomed when the buildings were new, some that were probably there all along, but unnoticed, and some that would not have been farmer had to be in and out of the building several times each day.


Common pigeons were once yearround residents at every diverse farm operation, taking up their station in hay lofts among the rafters, and announcing anyone's arrival in the loft with that unique slap, slapping of their wings as they exited through the open loft door. Their fat young, known as squabs, sometimes graced farm tables as a seasonal delicacy. They like to stay high, though, and their numbers have declined along with the barns and hay lofts tall enough to attract them.

Any large building with open windows or doors might still provide a home to a colony of those sparkling aerial acrobats the swallows. Their cheerful chatter and nests made of barnyard mud tucked along rafters up under ceilings, were as sure a sign that spring had come as any, on the farm. Where will they go when the last old barn is gone?

In fact, old farm buildings still are Never welcomed, but present occupied by a host of wild birds where ever humans build, mice and rats still find farm buildings new and old to their liking. Most native owls willingly enter open old buildings in search of prey, and often perch in lofts where they such welcomed guests when the leave their calling cards, pellets of compressed fur and bone which they cough up after a mouse meal. This includes the barn owl, now endangered over much of its range, as old buildings and nearby pastures where they nested and hunted, has disappeared. A badger may burrow after rodents under barn foundations.

Bats readily make use of crevasses between rafters high up in old farm buildings where they quietly await evenings of insect hunting. Many species of these mostly beneficial mammals are also in decline across Britain, due, at least in part, to the loss of old farm building habitat.

The farm animals and stored crops they were built for may be long gone, but old farm buildings are still attractive homes to a host of wild creatures who will miss them as, year by year, more of them crumble and disappear from our rural landscape.

Best practice involves a multidisciplinary team (MDT) led by a neurologist with support from therapists.

number of items can be saved from consignment to the bin!'

The new venue at Southill has extensive free parking in the shopping area car park next door. There is a drop off point outside of the centre where larger items can be left temporarily. There's a friendly cafe area where visitors can have tea and cake whilst waiting a turn to have an item repaired. There is an opportunity to leave a small donation for the work, which goes to local charities, and to pay for any spares that may have been used. Sometimes items that are repairable but not on the day can be taken home for a repairer to complete the fix at home, with agreement. 



Glass Fishing Floats

I can remember, as a child, when the occasional green glass fishing float would be washed up on Chesil beach, these days it is very rare, as most of the floats are now plastic. The local fishermen used the floats on the top of their nets, but they were very vulnerable to breaking free, especially in the days before man-made ropes were commonplace.

The use of the first glass fishing floats can be traced as far back as 1840. The Norwegians used a small egg-sized float on which they tied a fishing line and a hook. As the use of nets increased, Norway went on to produce other sizes of floats, since glass was an economical method of supporting the nets and offered plenty of buoyancy. Many European countries soon began using glass floats. Trademarks or embossing began appearing on the floats to identify the users and manufacturers of the floats.

Around 1910, far eastern countries, primarily Japan began manufacturing and using glass floats, hence their most popular name; Japanese Glass Fishing Floats. To accommodate different fishing styles and nets, the Japanese experimented with many different shapes of floats, from as small as 2 inches in diameter to the gigantic size of 20 inches in diameter.

Most glass floats are shades of green because the glass used was primarily recycled wine bottles, but clear, amber, aquamarine, amethyst, blue and other colours were also produced. The most prized and rare colour being a red, or cranberry hue. These were expensive to make because gold was used to produce the colour. Other brilliant jewel tones such as emerald green, cobalt blue, purple, yellow and orange were primarily made in the 1920s -30s.

Air bubbles are typical of the rapid, recycled glass process, as the floats were made as inexpensively as possible. They were quickly blown with a blowpipe, removed from the blowpipe and sealed with a 'button' of melted glass and placed in a cooling oven to cool down. The sealing button has somehow mistakenly become known as a pontil

A pontil (or punty) is the solid metal rod that is tipped with a wad of hot glass and used to hold a glass object during the blowing process. This leaves an irregular ring-shaped



scar on the base when removed, and that is called a pontil mark, but pontils were not used for blowing class floats.

Hand-blown floats have no seams and often no markings and are the oldest floats. Identifying marks were often embossed on or near the sealing button, sometimes with intriguing symbols, and the air bubbles in the glass help identify a glass float as authentic. Wooden moulds were later used to speed up the float-making process. These mould marks can be seen as seams on the outside of the glass and occasionally you can see the actual knife marks where the wood was carved.

Cork and aluminium floats appeared around 1920. These soon began to replace glass floats since they were more durable and could provide holes or eye features that made net attachment easier and more reliable. As manufactur-

ing techniques improved, plastic floats soon followed and these are normally what you will find on local beaches, often accompanied by the ubiquitous tar encrusted rope!

Today, the best places to find reproduction glass floats are in gift shops and nautical suppliers. 
